From Our Pastor

I found this story the other day while doing some research. I couldn't find the authors name but I thought it might be helpful as we journey together through this old world! It's not about a groundhog --- it's about a butterfly! *Grace and Peace*.

A man found a cocoon one day as he was hiking and decided to take it home. As he was looking at it later that day, a small opening appeared. He sat and watched, as the butterfly that was trapped within, struggled for hours to force its body through that little hole. It appeared to the man that the butterfly had gotten as far as it could but could not complete the task --- so the man decided to help the butterfly. He took a pair of scissors and carefully snipped off the remaining bit of the cocoon. The butterfly then emerged easily. But it had a swollen body and small, shriveled wings. The man continued to watch the butterfly because he expected that, at any moment, the wings would enlarge and expand and the butterfly would take flight in beauty and majesty. It never happened --- in fact; the butterfly spent the rest of its short life crawling around with a swollen body and shriveled wings. It never was able to fly. What the man, in his kindness and haste, did not understand was that the restricting cocoon and the struggle required for the butterfly to get through the tiny opening were God's way of forcing fluid from the body of the butterfly into its wings so that it would be ready for flight once it achieved its freedom from the cocoon.

Sometimes struggles are exactly what we need in our lives.

If God allowed us to go through our lives without any obstacles, it would cripple us.

We would not be as strong as what we could have been. We could never fly!

I asked for Strength... and God gave me Difficulties to make me strong.

I asked for Wisdom... and God gave me Problems to solve.

I asked for Prosperity... and God gave me Brain and Brawn to work.

I asked for Courage... and God gave me Danger to overcome.

I asked for Love... and God gave me Troubled people to help.

I asked for Favors... and God gave me Opportunities.

I received nothing I wanted ... I received everything I needed!

# FAITH SEEKERS

The Faith Seekers class recently finished a study of Kyle Idleman's book entitled <u>The End</u> of Me. CCAP, the Congregational-Community Action Project, is a cooperative ministry of 45 area churches and one synagogue serving Winchester and Frederick County that have joined together to provide financial, material and supportive assistance to people in need. CCAP is located at 112 and 106 S. Kent Street.



Thank you for generously supporting CCAP last month. On January 15<sup>th</sup>, CCAP Day, we collected 11 pairs of men's long underwear, a 3-pack of Men's T-shirts and 140 pairs of girl's, boy's and women's socks. These items will get such good use by our clients.

On Tuesday, January 17<sup>th</sup>, with the wonderful support of the Ruritans and many awesome volunteers, we made 10 gallons of Chili, loaded it up and took it to CCAP where we served approximately 75 clients and volunteers. We also provided bread, homemade cookies and water. We had 13 quart size bags of chili left for later distribution at CCAP. It was a very rewarding experience for all of our volunteers. The Outreach Committee is so thankful for the tremendous support for this Ministry to CCAP. This could not have happened without the volunteers, the kitchen and cooker from the Ruritans and the donations. We are hoping to make this a yearly event and are planning to add Corn Bread the next time.

### Notes from the January quarterly CCAP

**meeting:** We currently are in good shape with clothes; but volunteers are always needed. In the pantry, individual meat items (ex. Tuna in pouches) are always needed for our homeless clients. Also needed are individual packages of knives, forks, spoons, napkins and hand wipes in plastic bags. Peanut butter and jelly is always useful for all our clients.

<u>The Red Wagon Ministry's</u> aid to clients went up by 16% in 2016; 3358 diapers a month were given out. They are currently in need of 18 month, 24 month and 2T size girl's clothing and 2, 4, and 5 size diapers. This Ministry recently added books to their inventory and would appreciate any new or gently used children's books.

If you have any jobs the homeless could do at your home or business, please contact Fran Ricketts at CCAP. CCAP is always looking to give a "hands up" to those in need.

ABC Chiropractic is holding a "Heal the Pantry" fundraiser for CCAP. From January 9 – February 16, for a donation of \$15 worth of pantry items or \$20 in clothing items; you can receive an Initial Chiropractic Evaluation for yourself or someone you love. This applies to new patients only. This includes all necessary X-Rays.

Faith and Health Corner February 2017 American Heart Month



As we prepare to enter the Lenten season, we can use this time to reflect upon our hearts – physically, emotionally and spiritually. The Bible reminds us, "A heart at peace gives life to the body." (Proverbs 14:30) Physically you can reduce your risk of heart disease by choosing to quit smoking permanently, controlling your blood pressure, checking it regularly, exercising at least 3 times a week for 20 minutes or more, and eating a balanced diet low in fat, cholesterol and salt. Learning about our emotions assists us in experiencing harmony and wholeness in our lives. Love, acceptance, and affirmation in our relationships help us celebrate our oneness as children of our heavenly Father, and help us care for out emotional hearts. We care for our spiritual hearts by setting aside time in our schedules for worship, Bible study, prayer and communion.

Thanks to research advances over the past 50 years, the U.S. has seen a dramatic decline in mortality due to heart disease. However, it remains the nation's leading cause of death. After decades of notable decreases in cardiovascular deaths, the latest data on annual mortality rates published December 2016 found that U.S. life expectancy at birth declined by 0.1% a year and that deaths from heart disease increased by 0.9%.

These findings are concerning, but the good news is that heart disease is preventable and, in some cases, even reversible through management of risk factors such as obesity, diabetes, high blood pressure, and high cholesterol. It's time to step up our efforts by helping ourselves and others understand these risk factors and control them.

# From a branch on the Vine,

The winged beast glides through the ashen clouds drawing a fierce image to those who gaze to the heavens. It kindles fear with each emission of fire. The dragon rules the sky and all below. Wow, that would be an intimidating sight, but with every dragon that has ever been portrayed in a movie, like Lord of the Rings or Harry Potter, the beast has a weak spot. It is formidable except for the one area of vulnerability, and that is the spot that slays the beast.

We all have a vulnerability that when breached will be our downfall - a quick temper, food, lust, alcohol, pride, fear, stubbornness, an unforgiving heart - so on and so on. Although we



charge through life believing we have it all under control, that we cannot stumble, we carry with us a frailty that alters our plans and our peace. Though we pretend to be strong, we are weak – vulnerable. I have weak spots. You do, too. We all do. Spots that derail us from who God calls us to be.

If we are crafty, we can hide our weaknesses; guard against exposing our vulnerability – manage it. The Gospel of Luke tells us, *there is nothing hidden that will not be disclosed, and nothing concealed that will not be known or brought out into the open*. How can we survive this earthly life and even thrive? Because, we are not alone. God is with us, in us, through us, for us. We are <u>not</u> destined for failure. The end has already been promised to be victory.

<sup>3</sup> ... don't you know that all of us who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? <sup>4</sup> We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, **we too may live a new life.** 

<sup>5</sup> For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his...<sup>8</sup> Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. <sup>9</sup> For we know that since Christ was raised from the dead, he cannot die again; death no longer has mastery over him. <sup>10</sup> The death he died, he died to sin once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. <sup>11</sup> In the same way, count yourselves dead to sin but alive to God in Christ Jesus. (**Romans 6**)

Our Savior told Paul, "*My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.*" Christ reveals and applies Himself in our imperfect, weak lives. By His strength, He can heal our weakness. Let the scars be the evidence that it is Jesus who can use something bad for good.

Please notice the word "easy" is intentionally not used. The battle to overcome our weaknesses is VERY hard and a life-long challenge. Sin is creeping at the door, waiting for the moment to make a mess of a beautiful life. Faith in Jesus is not the absence of struggle. It is victory in the struggle. We are Overcomers!

#### <sup>11</sup> Here is a trustworthy saying: If we died with him, we will also live with him; <sup>12</sup> if we endure, we will also reign with him. **(2 Timothy 2)**

My God knows what trips me up; ensnares me and brings me low; steals my joy; and steers me off the path that leads to Him. He knows I am a broken vessel and am unable to succeed on my own. He knows, and He responds by being my ever-present help, my fortress, and my buttress to hold me up when the storms come - by my mistakes and because the world is broken in sin. I need saving; so God sent a Savior.

If you can go through life unscathed and whole, you are amazing. I can't, but I will be victorious because my Lord is amazing.
