In a galaxy many years ago, I used to work on HVAC equipment. To accomplish the many tasks required to be successful, I used a variety of tools. Without those tools, some that were very specialized, I would not have been able to fulfill the requirements of the profession I was in. Fixing things was my mission!

In our beloved United Methodist Church tradition, we pastors use many tools also, to try and accomplish our task. Our task is not to fix equipment or people --- but to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The first tool and most important one; the one that without it, no other tools would be of any use --- is the Bible! The Word of God holds primacy over all the other tools. It is at the top of the tool pyramid; it's the pinnacle of tool supremacy; I think you get the point. The Bible is the word of God, supreme and authoritative. *"All scripture is God breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting, and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work."* **2**nd **Tim. 3:16-17**

Another tool is our UMC hymnal. The songs contained therein are theological in nature and cover a myriad of spiritual music. They reveal God's continuing process of transformation and new life offered through the history behind their words and creation. It covers seasonal and liturgical elements of our faith as well as providing us with prayers, Psalters, and other theologically significant aids to our worship and our spiritual growth. The UMC hymnal is much more than just a song book!

The sermons of our founder, John Wesley, are also a valuable addition of our tool box as they provide a reference for many of our theological positions. Our UMC Book of Worship can be included in our tool list as it also provides the pastor with tried and true liturgies for weddings, baptisms, and funerals ---- and for many other ministry and mission challenges and settings.

Scripture is always supreme but what holds the tool box together is the biblically based tool of our UMC Book of Discipline. The United Methodist Church is not a congregational church, in that no UM churches stand alone. We are not autonomous. We are connected and the Book of Discipline provides much needed unity; unity in our purpose, direction, order and polity. Without the Discipline, just like any culture or family, we would fall into chaos. The Discipline provides, through the scriptures and our history and heritage -- a basis for all that we hold dear. It is so important to who we are as United Methodists, that we --- who are privileged to serve God as bishops, deacons, and pastors are asked to make covenant in front of God to defend this connectional glue of our faith.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE CONTINUES......

Following is the pledge that the ordained are asked to make in covenant with our Lord. "Will you be loyal to the United Methodist Church accepting its order, liturgy, doctrine, and discipline, defending it against all doctrines contrary to God's Holy Word, and committing yourself to be accountable to those serving with you, and to the bishop and those who are appointed to supervise your ministry?" If so, your answer is: I will with the help of God.

I answer yes to this covenant and I was taught by loving Christian parents as well as the scriptures, to let my yes be yes and my no be no --- in other words. Keep your promises and do what you said you were going to do! I will honor my covenant and I will continue to use the tools God has given the church to fulfill its mission. May your tool box be filled with those instruments of faith that bring you meaning, purpose, hope, faith, love, and peace!

CCAP, the Congregational-Community Action Project, is a cooperative ministry of 45 area churches and one synagogue serving Winchester and Frederick County that have joined together to provide financial, material and supportive assistance to people in need. CCAP is located at 112 and 106 S. Kent Street.

A BIG THANK YOU to our congregation!!!

- 1) We provided 44!! Easter Baskets for the giveaway. These baskets were prepared with a lot of love and consideration for those who would receive them.
- 2) We collected 2,154 diapers at our Maundy Thursday Service. This is incredible. These diapers will be used by at least 72 babies.

A few highlights from the quarterly CCAP Business Meeting held on April 20:

- 97 cents of every \$1 donated goes to clients.
- In the 1st quarter of 2017 5,656 families have been served from the Pantry; 1,873 families have been served from Clothing. Total aide: 8,405 families.
- 530 Easter Baskets were given away.

Current Needs at CCAP:

- Volunteers are always needed in the clothing area. A couple of hours a week goes a long way.
- The pantry is always in need of TOILET PAPER, LAUNDRY DETERGENT, DEODORANT, RAZORS FOR MEN AND WOMEN, CANNED MEAT (NOT TUNA AT THIS TIME), SUNSCREEN, CHAP STICK, AND BUG SPRAY. These can be dropped off during regular hours at CCAP
- As mentioned before STAPLES' rewards are always appreciated. Interviewers are still needed. Some computer skills are needed and training will be provided.
- RED WAGON Ministry: Is currently in need of sizes 2, 5 and 6 diapers.
- SCHOOL SUPPLIES giveaway: Our next CCAP collection will be for School Supplies. The giveaway will be in Mid-July. I will send out more information as the time draws closer.

On Thursday, April 20th, we had 20 members, including our Pastor, plus three guests who are joining our group. What a great group to hear Robin Russell, a new church member, and now Managing Director of The Trinity House, tell about this home that provides transitional housing for women and children. Their goal is to help women get back on their feet by offering housing, life skill training, emotional support, Bible Study, etc. They contribute rent based on their ability to pay. We will keep these women in our prayers, stay in contact with them and offer help in any way we can.

We are also planning some ways to connect with our Project Esperanza friends in the Dominican Republic. You won't want to miss the June meeting as plans are in the works to do something special.

Martha Ludtke and I attended the District Spring Event on Saturday, April 22nd at Crums UMC. We explored what community means with the topic "What Community Looks Like." This was under the umbrella of the Charter for Racial Justice. Sixty-some women were in attendance and it was interesting and well organized. Burnt Factory UMW will host the Fall Event on November 11th!

We urge all women to cut out the canceled postage stamps, leaving ¼" edge, and also the Boxtops for Education. Put them in the lavender box on the table in the Social Hall. We turned in lots at the district meeting at Crums as well as the Prayer Breakfast in March. This stamp project began in 1982 to provide funds for United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). Stamps are given to the York River District UMW President who passes them on to a stamp collector. The proceeds for stamp sales are sent to the Conference Treasurer for distribution to UMCOR. Through 2011, \$4,080 has been received by UMCOR from canceled stamps. A little bit of effort on our part amounts to dollars for those in need. If you purchased supplies last summer for Kits for Conference, bring them in and put them on the ledge downstairs in the old Scout room by the old kitchen. We will be putting those 50 school kits together sometime in May for our pastor to take to annual conference in June. In the July newsletter I'll list the supplies we need to shop for over the summer.

The date for the June UMW meeting has been changed to June 22nd. Many of us will be involved with Relay for Life June 16-17. We want to have good attendance at both of these.

We had a great meeting in April and thank Penny Croll and Robin Russell for the program, Nancy Hulver, Theresa Gilbert and Allie Goode for refreshments. Please feel free to take any of the seed packets left on the table with missionary names who have birthdays in May. Pray for them and e-mail them a greeting!

From a branch on the Vine,

Precious Lord, take my hand Lead me on, let me stand I'm tired, I'm weak, I'm worn Through the storm, through the night Lead me on to the light Take my hand precious Lord, lead me home



This beautiful hymn by Rev. Thomas Dorsey gives us a picture of the way Jesus is to us. He is willing, able and near.

Jesus is so many things. He is divine as King of kings; yet we can identify with Him as we face our trials as He faced His. As one with the Father and Holy Spirit, Jesus was there before creation – all things were made through Him. He sits at the right hand of God the Father. He grieved, and other times He was happy. He welcomed the children and rebuked the religious elders. He loved and knew the bitterness of love unreturned. Joy was within Him and around Him, as was pain.

In his book, <u>Shame & Grace</u>, Lewis Smedes takes a moment to reflect on this dual relationship we experience with God – *a feeling of smallness (weakness) in contrast to His divinity and a feeling of shame in contrast to His humanity* (pg. 48).

Of His divinity, Smedes writes, "So near, so far – like any tomorrow, at my fingertips, but unreachable...Sometimes I feel God's unshaped vastness with something like awe...now and then like the quirkish terror when I stand at the foot of a tall building and look straight up the sides. There is no shame in it. I do not feel shame when I feel small at the rim of the Grand Canyon or sluggish at the sight of a fleeting gazelle. Why should I feel shame when I feel my smallness next to God's infinity?"

Of His Humanity, Smedes pens, "When I meet God in His Humanity (Jesus), I am face to face with my own true self, and I feel a fierce dissatisfaction with the self I actually am for failing to be more of what I am meant to be. I feel heavy about how easily I lose my way. I compare His love with mine and I am ashamed of my egotism and selfishness."

One God yet so much bigger than one way to experience Him. Are you in awe of the One who is over all things, knows all things, is everywhere at all times? This may start a little throbbing in your head as you try to grasp the fullness of God. Try counting the stars or sing the song of water that flows over a bed of stones. Beyond comprehension is OK; but do you stand amazed at Who God is?

I have been overwhelmed and bewildered about who God is, like Mary, upon hearing the Holy Spirit would come upon her and she would give birth to God's son – "How can this be?" I have also felt small and insignificant to the endless expanse of God's presence. Then....I remember God knows my name.

And, I have been ashamed of my choices and outcomes when I know God has planned a better way for me. The weight of failure presses on my heart, and I want to hide from God. Then....I remember He knows how I feel and still, even now, asks to take away the chains I have placed on myself.

Smedes concludes, "When God tells me He loves me, His grace heals the shame (who we settle to be in contrast to who God created us to be). Grace overcomes the contrast.

Knowing – really depending on – the promise that God loves me brings hope and newness every day.

Take my hand, Lord, lead me home.
