Bishop Sharma Lewis opened Annual Conference with a powerful message representing the theme shown above. She encouraged us to stop "playing church" and "**be** the church." We are encouraged to stir/agitate/shake it up! Our NEW THING may require us to change our focus, clarify our focus and commit to God's plan. Contrary to what we constantly hear, our future is more interesting than our past; we are moving forward; we are dismissing the negativity! Bishop Lewis shared with us that having a vision does the following: brings clarity, evokes emotions, provides motivation, sets direction and translates a purpose. A leaders passion + the congregation + community needs = shared vision. Where these intersect is where God speaks. Incorporating new, fresh and innovative ideas of ministry will support the new vision of the Conference:

"Our ministry vision for the Virginia Annual Conference is to be disciples of Jesus Christ, who are lifelong learners and who influence others to serve."

Bishop Lewis is a powerful speaker. A preacher completely led by the Holy Spirit. A woman completely devoted to God. It was a privilege to hear her speak and if you ever have the chance, please do so. She reminded us that we have work to do but as lifelong learners, as influencers, we can be better disciples serving others which will ultimately make Disciples of Christ for the transformation of the World!

BUSINESS NOTES:

There were five Constitutional Amendments voted upon. Results will be posted once all the Conferences have met. There were five Resolutions presented in the Book of Reports. Resolution 4: Holy Land Travel and Resolution 5: Hydraulic Fracturing Oil and Gas were approved.

The Commission on a Way Forward was proposed by the Council of Bishops and approved by the 2016 General Conference to do a complete examination and possible revision of every paragraph of the *Book of Discipline* concerning human sexuality and explore options that help to maintain and strengthen the unity of the church. The Council of Bishops has asked each annual conference to engage in dialogue to get questions answered and give input. They are studying numerous proposals and other denominations, and essential things before they submit a proposal. He said the commission is working kindly and respectively.

Faith and Health Corner July 2017 Healthy Eating in the Summer

So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God. 1 Corinthians 10:31

Smart Summer Snacks – Summer is here and that means the kids are home from school. Instead of grazing all day, encourage your kids to stay on a meal schedule. Help them plan smart snacks. Such as:

- Raw vegetables with low-fat dip
- Fresh fruit
- Homemade popsicles made from 100% fruit juice
- Italian ice
- Pudding made with low-fat milk

As with other food choices, snack with variety, balance and moderation. Smart snacking can make betweenmeal eating a valuable part of a healthy eating style for the whole family.

Safe Outdoor Eating – With warmer temperatures and more outdoor gatherings, summer is a time of increased risk of food poisoning. Before you pack your picnic basket, remember these simple food safety tips.

- Keep hot food hot and cold food cold
- Pack food in a well-insulated cooler with plenty of ice or icepacks to keep the temperature below 40 degrees F
- Transport the cooler in the back seat of your air-conditioned car instead of your hot trunk and keep the cooler closed tight
- Bring moist towelettes or soap and water to clean your hands and surfaces often
- Don't leave food outside in hot weather (90 degrees F or above) for more than one hour

Guidelines for Summer Barbecues - This summer, keep your feast safe and fun with these guidelines:

- Wash your hands (for about 20 seconds) before, during and after handling food. Pack hand sanitizer for times when soap and water aren't available
- Scrub the grill with hot, soapy water before each use
- When marinating, always use a separate brush for raw and cooked meats, or wash in hot, soapy water between uses
- Always use a meat thermometer to make sure meats are cooked to a safe internal temperature; hamburger to at least 160 degrees F and chicken breasts to 170 degrees F
- Remove from the cooler only the amount of raw meat, fish or poultry that will fit on the grill at one time

Safe Camp Lunches Make Kids Happy Campers – Help your children have a great camp experience with a safe and healthy brown bag lunch. Carrying lunch in the summer requires extra focus on food safety. If your child's lunch will sit out from the time they arrive at camp until lunchtime, pack all protein foods with an ice pack to keep the temperature below 40 degrees F. If you can't use an ice pack, choose protein foods that don't need refrigeration, like peanut butter or other nut butters.

FAITH AND HEALTH CORNER CONTINUES

Summer Heat Fluid Intake Challenges – Staying well hydrated is essential to maintaining adequate blood volume, energy levels and body functions. Most people should consume at least 8 to 12 cups per day. However, the exact amount depends on your activity level. If you are working or playing outside, your hydration needs are higher. In addition, if you have more muscle than fat, you also need to drink more liquid. Of course, with hot, humid days the need goes up. A quick estimation of dehydration is to check the color of your urine. It should be pale to colorless. Stay well hydrated by drinking water, juices, eating lots of fruits and vegetables.

The Relay for Life 2017 event ended at 6:30am June 17th, but I haven't stopped thinking about it. I was also in awe of how Pat Perry, HERSELF, raised \$7,905 of the \$25,334. And thoughts of the campsite decorations and the decades fashion show kept running through my head. n The Church and Stewardship

The word is "stewardship." What exactly does that mean? In recent culture, stewardship meant giving money for the work of the church. While this is one important aspect of stewardship, it doesn't even scratch the surface for what it should mean in our daily lives. In Jesus' time, the steward was the manager of the household. The steward was not the owner of the assets, but a responsible administrator of the owner's property.

THERE ARE FOUR BASIC PRINCIPLES AS WE EXPLORE MORE ABOUT WHAT IT MEANS IN OUR WALK OF FAITH.

THE FIRST IS THE PRINCIPLE OF OWNERSHIP. The 24th Psalm begins with "*The earth is the LORD's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.*" The first recognition is that all resources ultimately belong to God.

THE SECOND PRINCIPLE IS RESPONSIBILITY. It is the recognition that God has invited us to be responsible for the lives and resources that he has bestowed upon us. We have free will to make the choices that will shape our life. God owns everything; we are ultimately responsible for how we treat it and what we do with it.

THE THIRD PRINCIPLE IS ACCOUNTABILITY. We will be accountable to the owner as to how well we have managed those things entrusted to us. This includes an accounting of our time, relationships, abilities, wisdom and authority.

LASTLY, THE FOURTH PRINCIPLE IS REWARD. God doesn't want our money. He calls us to give of our time and our resources for the change it instills in our hearts. It breaks down our selfishness and allows change to happen. The reward comes from knowing within that change, we are made perfect through Jesus and his sanctifying grace.

I like to think of stewardship as managing God's blessings in God's way. If we do all things to God's calling, stewardship of all of our resources, including time and financial, will fall into place where it needs to be.
