Doug Powell who is the Director of the Lewis Center for Church Leadership shares these tips about inviting others to church.

Inviting others to anything is a scary proposition. The goal is an invitation that leaves space for others to say yes and that doesn't paint an overly negative or rosy picture. The challenge is we really do not like inviting individuals to church. The fear of rejection is one of the main reasons. Understandably most of us do not enjoy rejection at any level. Yet, if we are serious about sharing God's transforming love, then inviting others to a place where that can happen is important.

#### **CLUES FOR INVITING OTHERS**

- 1. THE INVITATION SHOULD BE ABOUT A GENUINE CONNECTION AND NOT STAGED. It is best to invite individuals to an event that has bearing on their life or appeals to their interests. It comes across as a genuine connection and not something staged that comes out of left field. I might say, for instance, "I have an extra ticket to hear that new group you like on Friday at 7. I would love for you to come with me." The connection is authentic because they have an interest in the group. If we translate this to inviting someone to church, then we share with them how the new sermon series on addictions may be helpful as they deal with a child in rehabilitation. The point is the invitation comes across as thoughtful and something that connects with the other person.
- **2. BE SPECIFIC.** Often, when we do invite, our invitations are very general. If I say to someone, "come to dinner at my house on Sunday," it leaves out important information, like the time of dinner and where I live. A better dinner invitation is "come over at 5 p.m. on Sunday and my address is 123 Main Street, which I will text you so you can Google directions." The same principle applies to church. Simply saying, "Why don't you come to my church on Sunday," is not as specific as "I would love for you to come to Main Street Congregation at 10 a.m. Our address is 123 Main Street, and I will meet you in the parking lot." Be specific!
- 3. BE HONEST ABOUT WHAT WE KNOW AND DO NOT KNOW. Another reason many of us do not invite is that we are afraid someone may ask us questions to which we do not know the answer, such as, "Why do bad things happen to good people?" It is okay if we do not have all the answers. In many cases others are relieved that we do not know everything. This communicates to others that you are not trying to sell them a bill of goods. We all have been in situations where a salesperson was willing to tell us anything to get us to buy the product. To exaggerate the point, imagine a salesperson saying you need this vacuum cleaner (that works well on shag carpet) when they know you only have hardwood floors in the house. This would leave a bad taste in your mouth. Honesty goes a long way and individuals respect those who are upfront with them.
- **4.** IT IS IMPORTANT TO INVITE WITH EXPECTANT HOPE. Do not invite with a defeatist attitude. There are times when we so underplay the invitation it comes across as if we really do not want the other person to come. For instance, a friend saying, "My family reunion is on Saturday. It probably won't be fun, but you might want to come if you have absolutely nothing else to do." This is not a compelling invite! But it's equally important not to go to the opposite extreme and be overly effusive. The goal is an invitation that leaves space for others to say yes without painting an overly negative or rosy picture.

#### PASTOR'S ARTICLE CONTINUES.....

Inviting others to anything is a scary proposition. This is especially true for church because of the personal nature of faith. I believe it is helpful to make a genuine connection, be specific, be honest and avoid shading the picture too bleakly or too rosily. Ultimately, we are inviting others to experience a transforming relationship with God.

# Faith and Health Corner October 2017

## Avoid Antibiotic Overuse

The prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise him up."

5 James 15

Using antibiotics wisely is the best way to ensure they work for future bacterial illnesses and prevent unnecessary side effects. Here are tips for how to use antibiotics wisely.

- **KEEP UP WITH VACCINATIONS**. Vaccinations help prevent infections that may require antibiotics and helps prevent diseases from spreading.
- **HAND WASHING**. Washing your hands is one of the best ways to keep yourself and your family healthy by preventing the spread of germs that cause infections.
- ASK ABOUT SYMPTOM RELIEF. Never pressure your healthcare provider for antibiotics, instead ask for the
  best treatment for your illness. Talk to your healthcare provider or pharmacist about how to relieve
  symptoms so that you can feel better.
- ONLY TAKE ANTIBIOTICS FOR INFECTIONS CAUSED BY BACTERIA. Illnesses caused by viruses, like the common cold and the flu, do not improve with antibiotics. Using antibiotics when they are not needed can cause harmful side effects and make antibiotics less powerful against certain bacteria.
- ASK IF WATCHFUL WAITING IS RIGHT FOR YOU. Even some bacterial infections, like mild sinus and ear
  infections, can get better without antibiotics. For some illnesses, your healthcare provider many recommend
  watchful waiting, meaning waiting a few days to see if you get better before deciding to prescribe antibiotics.
- ASK ABOUT SIDE EFFECTS. Talk to your healthcare provider or pharmacist about potential side effects of antibiotics.
- Take antibiotics exactly as prescribed. Even if you feel better, do not skip doses or stop taking an antibiotic early without approval from your healthcare provider.
- THROW LEFTOVER ANTIBIOTICS AWAY. Never save antibiotics for future illnesses, take antibiotics prescribed for others, or share antibiotics with others. Talk to your pharmacist about how to dispose of leftover antibiotics.



## From a Branch on the Vine

Identity Crisis – ever have one? Who am I? Who am I to others? I am not referring to the fact your spouse or Parents call you every name in the family (including the dog) and you finally answer when you hear yours; or, you are relegated to being, "Hey, you." And, my reference is not to identity theft – which I would be glad to go along with when the bills are due. My question is about knowing who you are and Whose you are?

Have you heard a song that reminds you of a person? Every time I hear a song from the band *Journey*, I think of Tammy Cunningham because I have heard her sing, with impassioned volume, their songs on every mission trip we shared together. Also, you must know by now, the walrus is my spirit animal.



We all have items, collections, songs, clothes that we associate with and are associated with us. It is part of what makes us – US.

Part of being US is the way we look and act. Not that I chose it, but I am part of the hairless club for men. Most wouldn't recognize me if I walked in with flowing locks. I wouldn't recognize me. What else identifies me or you? Is Jesus part of our identity? Do we hope the cross necklace or church membership is enough to be identified as a Christ follower? When people see you, do they see the attributes they would find in Jesus: mercy, grace, kindness, empathy, encouragement, honoring God ... love?

In his hymn, *They'll Know We Are Christians*, Peter Scholtes says you will be seen as a Christian by your love. This is based on the scripture John 13:34-35, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

If love permeates from you and is evident in your actions, others will know Christ is part of your life. Even more, look at this from the inside. Other people may associate you with Jesus on the outside, but have you surrendered to being changed by Jesus Christ in your very heart? Do you know how good God is by the gift of His son, Jesus, to be the payment for your mistakes? Do you place yourself in the family of God by your acceptance of what Jesus has done for you?

Unfortunately, many of us never feel truly and unconditionally loved by God. We imagine we are not worthy or we have not earned His free gift of redemption. When you wear the cross, let it be the mark of a changed heart that has willingly joined the eternal family of God.

When they say, "Hey, you" could they say, "Hey, adopted son or daughter of the Most High God?" Who you are is based on Whose you are?

## SCHEDULE FOR MAKING APPLE BUTTER

For anyone coming in new since last fall, (and to refresh the memory of others), here are the facts about our big fundraiser for the year, our Apple Butter Making Project October 19<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup>. There's always something for people of all ages to do. Web site <a href="http://burntfactory.org/main/?page\_id=952">http://burntfactory.org/main/?page\_id=952</a>. All <a href="new">new</a> Jars, which are purchased by the UMM, will be used this year. Pints are discouraged and if you order them, you must furnish your own <a href="new">new</a> Jars. <a href="The price of apple-butter this year is \$10.00 qt., \$5.00 pt. PLEASE GET YOUR ORDERS IN EARLY!!

The apples will be taken to the peeling garage **Thursday**, **October 19**<sup>th</sup>, the day the peeling process begins. The men usually begin the peeling process, but there are always women and youth who come to help. The sides of the shelter will be dropped and canvas placed across a part of the shelter to insure comfort while sitting and working. The fireplace will be ready for fire, which always feels good as the temperature drops outside. We have special peelers up in the building near the shelter area. As they come off the peelers they are put in plastic bags and placed back in the crates and taken down to the shelter where the quartering and "cleaning up" of the apples takes place. **This step begins at 9:00 a.m. Many hands** are needed for this step. Everyone who can is encouraged to come and help, even if it's just for a couple of hours. The more help we have, the easier it is on everyone. Bring a couple of big pans and a sharp knife and maybe a comfortable chair. It really is a social event, even fun! The ladies will bring soup, hot dogs, buns, drinks and desserts to tide us over until the "hour has come" to go home.

On Friday morning, the 20<sup>th</sup>, the kettles will be set and a canopy put over the kettles to protect the precious product from leaves, etc. Next step, washing the apples, which is a very demanding job and help is always appreciated; some women have also come to help. By this time, it's time for these loyal workers to go home, get something to eat and sleep awhile before coming back around midnight to begin the cooking. All ages meet to begin the project at midnight, which is the hardest part. Lighting the fires, putting the apples in the kettles and stirring is also a demanding job! About 20-30 helpers are needed at midnight. A few brave women and the dedicated youth get in on this part and work through the night to get it all started.

Early Saturday morning, about 5:00 a.m. a hearty breakfast will be ready for all the workers. After working throughout the night on donuts and coffee, the 6:00 a.m. call to breakfast, in shifts, of course, is a welcome invitation. Everyone is welcome to eat! By this time, relief help has come to give the early crew a break. The apples are now easier to stir. The sun is up and, hopefully, it's a pleasant, sunny day to finish the process. BUT, the project must be finished, regardless of the weather. The ladies will have brought soup, hot dogs, barbecue, buns, desserts, drinks, etc. (When we work, we eat)! Lunch is usually early, so we can get the tables cleaned up and get the area cleared for the jars that will be placed on the tables, ready for filling. Through experience, at just the right time, the sugar will be added (about 100# + to each kettle!). Then at just the right time, the spices will be added and very quickly it will be ready to take off. We have two special dispensers with cut-off valves for filling the jars. There are two assembly lines and everything must be done guickly to get the apple butter in the jars and lids screwed on tight. NO jars of butter will be taken by purchaser until ALL butter has been jarred and released. This cuts down on confusion and allows for an accurate count of butter made. All butter taken home must be recorded by the order-taking team. There's usually "oohs and aahs" after sampling the apple butter on rolls! It's the best apple butter in the land! Just ask us - and others, too! While some people are working in the assembly line, several of the men are cleaning up the kettles as they become empty. Then everything must be cleaned up, some utensils taken up to the church as well as the orders by people who aren't there to pick it up. The project is headed by Keith Roberts & Eddie Cooper.

A big project for a small church? You bet! It takes dedicated people who want to see it carried on. We have a wonderful reputation for our apple butter and hope it will continue for many years. Let's set aside the time that it takes for this once-a-year effort and continue this project in the same united way. So many programs in our church benefit from its profits. All apple butter not taken on Saturday will be at the church with the order name attached and any leftover apple butter will be available for additional sale. Please order your apple butter early. It may be paid for in advance or you may wait and pay when you pick it up.
