## *Our Pastor's New Years Message*

Ten years ago, I read a book that changed my life in regard to the practice of ministry. It was written by a United Methodist Bishop, Rev. Robert Schnase and was entitled, "Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations." For the last ten years, the practices outlined in the book have served to undergird, solidify, and provide direction for Burnt Factory UMC and its many ministry initiatives

Like Bishop Schnase, we at BFUMC believe people are looking for churches that demonstrate these practices. The five practices of fruitful congregations are: Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Intentional Faith Development, Risk-Taking Mission & Service and Extravagant Generosity. *"By repeating and improving these practices, churches fulfill their mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. These five practices capture the core process by which God uses congregations to make disciples."*

- Congregations offer the gracious invitation, welcome, and hospitality of Christ so that people experience a sense of belonging;
- God shapes souls and changes minds through worship, creating a desire to grow closer to Christ;
- God's Spirit nurtures people and matures faith through learning in community;
- With increased spiritual maturity, people discern God's call to help others through mission and service;
- God inspires people to give generously of themselves so that others can receive the grace they have known.

*"These practices not only describe the congregational activities through which God works to draw people into relationship, they also chart the path for growth in personal discipleship. Vibrant, fruitful, growing congregations are that naturally practicing these qualities and constantly seek ways to develop them further."*

As we embark on our Stewardship program for 2018, I thought it appropriate to remind you of these five practices and to particularly draw your attention to the fifth practice. I have been so thankful and blessed to be in partnership with a faith community that does, indeed, practice extravagant generosity! This congregation continues to amaze and astound me with your sacrificial giving! Thank you from the bottom of my heart for your steadfast faithfulness in supporting the ministries of BFUMC --- but more than that --- thank you for answering God's call upon your heart to be obedient to God's word!

*"Churches that model Extravagant Generosity give joyously, generously, and consistently in ways that enrich the souls of members and strengthen the ministries of the church. These congregations thrive because they give out of their love for God and neighbor. They focus on the abundance of God's grace and emphasize the Christian's need to give rather than the churches need for money. This is done in the spirit and manner of Christ."*

As we embark on our Stewardship & EGI programs for 2018, I want to encourage you, first and foremost, to pray and discern what God is calling you to give.

# Stewardship Program & Estimated Giving Initiative (EGI) for 2018

In 2008, Burnt Factory UMC, through the efforts of the Long Range Planning Committee, began dreaming of what the future would hold. God brought to us a vision that growth was coming so we planned and asked many questions and prayed and prayed and prayed some more. To make a long story short, BFUMC decided to enter into a Kingdom Expansion Plan. Our mind-set was formed around the truth that the expansion of our facility would be dedicated to fulfilling the mission of the church, which is: ***"To make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world,"*** so we were not concerned with building a church --- with mortar, bricks and the such --- but with building, in partnership with God, His Kingdom --- with love, faith and hope!

In 2014, we entered into an Estimated Giving Initiative (EGI) to support and finance our endeavor. After much planning, prayer and due diligence, we agreed unanimously, to begin a 1.2 million Kingdom Building expansion project. We redesigned and doubled our sanctuary. We added a Narthex complete with elevator. We added class rooms and outside cottages. We refurbished all existing rooms. We added additional parking spaces and a new septic system. From July of 2015 (when construction began) to September of 2016, (when we re-entered our church) we worshiped at Greenwood Mill Elementary School. I share this with you and especially our newest members and friends, because we will be beginning a debt retirement and future growth campaign in January of 2018. We made a decision in 2014 to plan and pay off our financial responsibility around a nine year goal. We decided to divide those nine years into three separate 3 year EGI commitment drives. The first 3 year EGI was over on the last day of 2017. It was very successful and we only owe approximately \$470,000 on January 1, 2018!

We will be entering into our second three year EGI campaign on January 21, 2018 and asking our congregation and friends to consider how and to what degree they want to participate in our EGI campaign. All the membership, family and friends of BFUMC will be receiving a packet of information detailing our campaign. We will be asking each member, family & friend to consider what God is leading them to give that will be over and above their normal tithe.

My hope, quite frankly, is to satisfy our current debt in the next 3 years, if not sooner, and to actually collect more than we need to help with future goals and further expansion opportunities.

I want to encourage everyone to consider prayerfully and with great discernment where God is leading you. It is not our desire to create a burden and we will not pressure anyone to participate in this initiative. As part of this informational EGI packet, you will receive an EGI card. If God has led you to consider this campaign, then I encourage you to mark the card in the way God has led you, place it in an envelope and either bring it on January 21<sup>st</sup> to lay upon the altar of the Lord or to mail it to the church, in care of Angie Wiseman, Financial chairperson, P.O. Box 399, Stephenson, Va. 22656.

We will continue to ask, whether you participate in the EGI campaign or not, that you would consider "first-fruit" and "intentional" giving practices (if you do not already adhere to these time honored truths of mature discipleship) in your regular offering. Our Consecration Service will be held on January 21, 2018 where we will celebrate and bring forth our EGI commitments to place them on the Altar of our Lord.

John Wesley instructed his pastors to “*Never trifle away time*” (**2012 DISCIPLINE** 330.5.d.19.a). Instead, they were to be engaged in the practice of ministry or the development of their spiritual lives. While we may not want to get rid of *all* time-wasters since we need times of rest, there are diversions we could remove and replace with something more beneficial.

Consider finding ways to free up time to volunteer at a local food bank or other mission, to make regular calls to old friends and church members you no longer see, or join a class or small group at your church.

### A VERSION OF THE BIBLE

If you have been a Christian for some time, you probably know the Bible fairly well. There are verses you know by heart, and stories that are very familiar. Reading from a different **VERSION OF THE BIBLE** can help bring new life to those passages. A translator’s decision to use one word over another may give you some new insight you hadn’t thought of before.

If you regularly read from a modern version like the Common English Bible, consider a more traditional translation like the New Revised Standard Version. If you gravitate toward the more traditional, try something more modern. Search the web for Bible reading sites and apps (there are many free ones) where you can access a new version of Scripture.

### A DEVOTIONAL

Devotionals are helpful aids to lead us in Scripture reading and prayer every day, but we can become stuck in a rut with them as well. If you have been using the same book or website for more than a year, you may benefit from trying something different this year. A new devotional resource, like an unfamiliar Bible translation, can bring new life to your time with God.

There are many devotional helps available online and in physical and digital books. **THE UPPER ROOM** from Discipleship Ministries of The United Methodist Church, is a very good source. Try something new.

### A FAVORITE AUTHOR

Many readers have favorite authors. We like the way they turn a phrase, develop a story, or how they put into words what we have thought or felt for some time. Growth, though, often comes from thinking about things from a variety of perspectives. Reading a variety of authors can challenge us to do just that.

When looking for a book to read for spiritual enrichment, from **COKEBURY** or **ABINGDON PRESS**, consider something new to you, which may be something old. You might want to read from a theologian whose work you have heard is important but you have never read, a person on the best-seller list whose views you think may be different from yours, or a recommendation from your pastor.

### A CLASS OR GROUP

Give yourself permission to take a break from that class or group you have been attending solely out of habit. It’s OK. Try a new class. **JOIN A GROUP** that discusses things that interest you.

Be careful with this one though. Connections to other people of faith are vital, so don’t pull away from all groups. If you take a break from one group, make sure you find other Christians with whom you can share and from whom you can learn.

### NEGATIVITY

Although we do not like to admit it, there are seasons when many of us can fall into patterns of negativity. Discouraged by the news, the theology of others, policies of our denomination, and practices of our congregation can become sources of stress and fodder for complaining.

**REMOVING NEGATIVITY** from our lives and choosing instead to find things to celebrate can lift your spirits and renew your passion for that which matters most. Find where you see the love of Jesus in the world and celebrate it.

### OBLIGATORY CHURCH-STUFF

Some of us do things in the church that bring us no joy. We're not really sure how we ever got the job. We don't really want it. Yet, we are pretty sure that if we don't do it, it won't get done. Those types of obligations often lead to church burnout.

The New Year is underway, schedule a conversation with your pastor. Ask how you can step away from that obligation and into a new way of using your gifts to serve your church or community. That will be a blessing both to you and your congregation.

### NEW POSSIBILITIES

The New Year can be one of new experiences in your church and spiritual life. Make room in days ahead for the Holy Spirit to do a new work in you. Then see what happens.

**HAPPY NEW YEAR!** I pray that you're looking forward to a wonderful new year with lots of possibilities and potential. Do you have a New Year's resolution? Have you given it any thought?

As we join the UMC, we are asked to give our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness.

Will you pray for the church daily? Will you pray that God will show you the work he has for you to do in and through the body of his Son? I believe that God will respond to that prayer by clearly showing you the work that needs to be done to support the church and reach out to the neighbors with the good news that Jesus is with us still today.

Will you be present at your church? One of the trends that we see in church today is that so many people believe that attending once or twice a month is considered a commitment. Christ gave his heavenly glory and his earthly life for our sakes. That's a true commitment. Will you make the same commitment to him? Will you commit to attend church weekly no matter what other worldly business seems more important at the time?

Will you give to your church? God has all the resources he needs to support and uphold his church, but he has given those resources to you to be the stewards of all he has. Will you give back to God a portion of what he's given to you so that the church can have the resources it needs to do God's work?

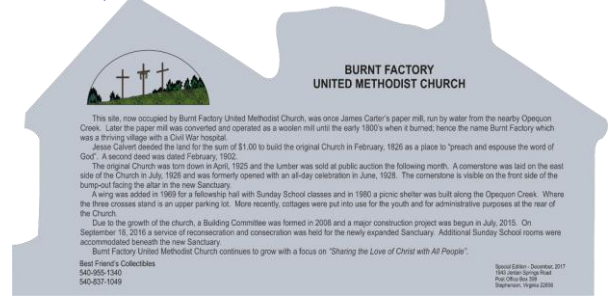
*Hello Everyone,*

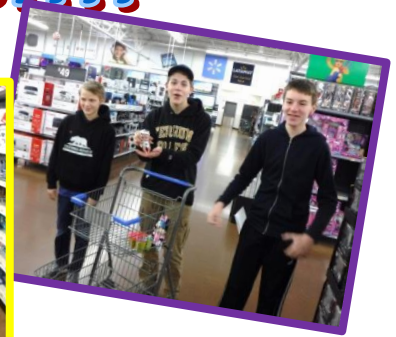

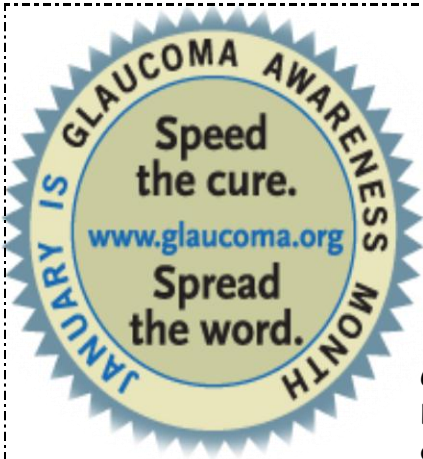

## Faith and Health Corner

### January is Glaucoma Awareness Month

**Glaucoma is the leading cause of irreversible blindness.  
Early detection is vital to stopping the progression of the disease.**

Glaucoma is a group of eye diseases that gradually steal sight without warning. For this reason, it is called "the sneak thief of sight." There are no symptoms and once vision is lost, it's permanent.

The vision loss begins with peripheral or side vision, so if you have glaucoma, you may not notice anything until significant vision is lost. As much as 40% of vision can be lost without noticing that it's gone!! The most common forms of glaucoma primarily affect the middle-aged and elderly, but it can affect people of all ages.

The loss of vision is caused by damage to the optic nerve. This nerve is responsible for carrying images from the eye to the brain. There is no cure for glaucoma-yet. However, medication or surgery can slow or prevent further vision loss. The appropriate treatment depends upon the type of glaucoma.

There are two main types of glaucoma and these are marked by an increase in intraocular pressure (pressure in the eye):

1. Primary open-angle glaucoma
2. Angle-closure glaucoma

When optic nerve damage occurs despite a normal intraocular pressure, this is called normal tension glaucoma. Secondary glaucoma means that another disease caused or contributed to increased eye pressure, resulting in optic nerve damage and vision loss.

Glaucoma is 6 to 8 times more common in African Americans and Latinos than Caucasians. Also, siblings of persons diagnosed with glaucoma have a significantly increased risk of having glaucoma. Currently more than 3 million Americans, and over 60 million people worldwide have glaucoma. The World Health Organization estimates that 4.5 million people worldwide are blind due to glaucoma.

There is a possibility for an impending epidemic of blindness if we don't raise awareness about the importance of regular eye examinations to preserve vision. Here are three ways you can help raise glaucoma awareness:

1. If you have glaucoma, don't keep it a secret. Let your family and friends know.

3. Share information about glaucoma with your friends and family

# From a branch on the Vine,

How do you recognize an invisible God? Our senses are limited – so primitive to the being of God; yet, they are our only tools to grasp His presence. For us, the limitless God accepted limits so that we could know Him. Jesus is the face of God. Through Him, we come to know who God is. In His human condition, we relate to our invisible God.

In his book, Reaching for the Invisible God, Philip Yancey describes the bridge Jesus provides to the Father, *"Does God really want close contact with us? Jesus gave up heaven for it. In person, He reestablished the original link between God and human beings, between seen and unseen worlds."* Continuing; *"God became one of creation's creatures...the God who fills the universe imploded to become a peasant baby who had to learn to walk and talk and dress himself. In the incarnation, Jesus exchanged omniscience for a brain that learned Aramaic; omnipresence for two legs, omnipotence for arms to saw wood. Instead of overseeing a hundred billion galaxies as one, He looked out on the streets of Nazareth and the Judean desert."*

In Emmanuel, God is with us. Do you struggle believing God is with us? Do doubts creep in as to where is God when people are starving, mistreated, forgotten? Or, when tragedy strikes, dreams aborted, lives cut short? In Jesus, we see the character of God. Jesus, part of the God-head, healed the slave of a Roman soldier because he had compassion – as He did to the adulterous woman brought before Him by religious leaders. The leper was cleansed, the hungry were fed, and sight was restored to the blind. None of the miraculous actions were required but provided from a bottomless well of love. God, as revealed in Jesus, suffered pain with whips and thorns, nails and a spear – not because He was protected from pain (He wasn't). He loved us more than the pain, more than the ridicule, more than our ambivalence and disobedience.

A Savior came to save – to be the balm for what this world does to us.

My Jesus is not distant. He is real. Many times, He and I have walked the beach as He did with Peter, hearing my desperate request to be forgiven. And, He provides forgiveness by the human life He knowingly gave up on the cross.

We all wish for better circumstances, more pleasant, pain and worry-free lives, don't we? That is not the world we exist in. Jesus lived in our broken world; yet, He overcame our world and offers us the same.

*Now that we know what we have—Jesus, this great High Priest with ready access to God—let's not let it slip through our fingers. We don't have a priest who is out of touch with our reality. He's been through weakness and testing, experienced it all—all but the sin. So let's walk right up to him and get what he is so ready to give. Take the mercy, accept the help. **Hebrews 4:14-16 from The Message***

Come to Jesus. He is not far away. He is here and brings love to you.

My friends, on behalf of my family, we humbly thank you for embracing and uplifting us; inspiring us to be better. Your generosity of spirit is more than financial, more than a touch of kindness. It is the gift of Emmanuel that you have expressed to us. Thank you. May you feel how close and personal God desires to be with you each moment of each day.
