From Pastor's F

Friends, now that we are back in our new beautifully refurbished and renovated church, what are to do now? Are we to rest from our labor; are we to take a sabbatical from discipleship? Are we to stop attempting to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world?

Or are we supposed to see anew the many mission fields that are awaiting us? Are we to seek out as Captain Kirk would say; strange new worlds --- are we to knock upon the door of those in poverty and want? Are we to strike out against injustice? Are we to seek peace and bestow grace? Our work for the kingdom will never be completed and our zeal for God's work must never diminish! In my "Revival" class; a class based upon Adam Hamilton's book of the same name, we are studying our founder John Wesley's spiritual formation. We are exploring what it means to be a Methodist and what may help us in our own private revival as well as leading us to help with a church wide revival. Wesley suggests that there are "means of grace" that can help us begin revival. These means of grace exemplify Wesleyan and Methodist theology and doctrine in that they combine works of piety and works of mercy. They combine and compliment the necessity of head and heart working in tandem and they integrate personal and communal practices. Following is a copy of the "means of grace" with a brief explanation. I hope you take them to heart and to head!

The Wesleyan Means of Grace: Courageous and forward-leaning mission congregations practice spiritual disciplines. Our vital work is a spiritual adventure based in John Wesley's means of grace. John Wesley taught that God's grace is unearned and that we were not to be idle waiting to experience grace but we are to engage in the means of grace. The means of grace are ways God works invisibly in disciples, hastening, strengthening, and confirming faith so that God's grace pervades in and through disciples. As we look at the means of grace today, they can be divided into works of piety and the works of mercy.

Works of Piety

Individual Practices – reading, meditating and studying the scriptures, prayer, fasting, regularly attending worship, healthy living, and sharing our faith with others.

Communal Practices – regularly share in the sacraments, Christian conferencing (accountability to one another), and Bible study.

Works of Mercy

Individual Practices – doing good works, visiting the sick, visiting those in prison, feeding the hungry, and giving generously to the needs of others.

Communal Practices – seeking justice, ending oppression and discrimination (for instance Wesley challenged Methodists to end slavery), and addressing the needs of the poor.

Making disciples, growing vital congregations and transforming the world is part of a spiritual adventure that is empowered and guided by the Holy Spirit as churches engage in the means of grace. Spiritual goals are accomplished by connecting the means of grace with proven vital church practices such as planning, strategic direction, prioritization, clear focus and alignment.



WATTS -- Winchester Area Temporary Thermal Shelter

The WATTS schedule has been released for the 2016-2017 season. Burnt Factory UMC will be hosting the WATTS guests the week of November 28-December 5 at the Stonewall Ruritan. Please mark your calendars, as we will be in need of volunteers in all areas during that week.

It is a great week of fellowship, giving back and yet another opportunity for us to share the love of Christ with all people. This is such a fulfilling experience and one that will prove to fill your heart.

For those of you who may be new to BFUMC or not quite sure what it means for us to be the host to WATTS for a week, here's a little more info about the WATTS program.

Please watch for updates as our hosting week gets closer. We will provide sign-up sheets for all volunteer positions available.

HOW IT WORKS:

Area faith communities and service organizations host up to 35 adult homeless guests from 7:00PM to 7:00AM for seven nights, beginning on a Monday evening at 7:00PM and concluding on the following Monday morning at 7:00AM. A healthy, nutritious dinner and a light breakfast is provided each day.

STAFFING:

An Executive Director manages a staff of paid, trained night WATTS managers who manage the shelter every night. In addition, each host site and their partners provide a daily team of volunteers (approximately 10-12 people), who furnish the meals, offer optional evening activities, and spend the night (2 volunteers) and, as needed, assist in transporting guests to county shelter locations.

From a Branch on the Vine

So, what do you think of our church? The beautiful chancellor area; the new technology; chandeliers, comfy chairs. Perfect? No, but I hope you find it a place to experience God. How about the Children's Wing? Wow! And, the library, and the signs giving directions across our campus. Where can a Mom go with a restless baby or someone who has restless legs? Monitors are installed in the Narthex and Social Hall so no one needs to feel disconnected from worship. Our church has much to offer.



With everything that has been accomplished, our mission remains the same, **To Share the Love of Christ with ALL People**. Burnt Factory is a destination for new and old followers to encounter Jesus; to grow from hearing about our Savior to meeting him; from impression to transformation. Jesus does that. He moves those who encounter Him from existence to holiness. The apostle Peter was so moved:

Luke 5 One day as Jesus was standing by the Lake of Gennesaret (Sea of Galilee), the people were crowding around him and listening to the word of God. ² He saw at the water's edge two boats, left there by the fishermen, who were washing their nets. ³ He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon (Peter), and asked him to put out a little from shore. Then he sat down and taught the people from the boat.

⁴ When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But **because you say so**, I will let down the nets."

⁶ When they had done so, they caught such a large number of fish that their nets began to break. ⁷ So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them, and they came and filled both boats so full that they began to sink.

⁸ When Simon Peter saw this, he fell at Jesus' knees and said, "Go away from me, Lord; I am a sinful man!" ⁹ For he and all his companions were astonished at the catch of fish they had taken, ¹⁰ and so were James and John, the sons of Zebedee, Simon's partners.

Then Jesus said to Simon, "Don't be afraid; from now on you will fish for people." ¹¹ So they pulled their boats up on shore, left everything and followed him.

Encountering Jesus, Simon Peter fell to his knees and confessed his unworthiness to be in the presence of the Son of God – and Jesus changed his life. *Then Jesus said to Simon*, "*Don't be afraid; from now on you will fish for people*." Jesus changes lives. Each of us has a choice to respond to Him or dismiss Him; to obey (*because He says so*) or continue on our own path doing it our way. He changes water to wine, fishermen to apostles, and He can and will change you. The love, peace and forgiveness you may have never known are yours from a loving Father who comes to each of us by way of the cross.

What do you think of our church? A more important question is what is Jesus to you? Do you know only about Him or have you come to meet Him? God loves you; let Him love you into a new creation.

Schedule for Making Apple Butter





For anyone coming in new since last fall, (and to refresh the memory of others), here are the facts about our big fundraiser for the year, our Apple Butter Making Project October 13th–15th. There's always something for people of all ages to do. Cheryl Wagoner will be taking the orders for Apple Butter and it can even be ordered through the church website http://burntfactory.org/main/?page_id=952. All new Jars, which are purchased by the UMM, will be used this year. Pints are discouraged and if you order them, you must furnish your own new Jars. The price of Apple Butter this year is \$10.00 qt., \$5.00 pt. Cheryl's email is cwag1@comcast.net. Phone (540-336-3302). PLEASE GET YOUR ORDERS IN EARLY!!

This year on October 1st we will start to gather around 8:30am; pickers will meet at the orchard behind Walmart, Route 50, to pick about 85 bushels of apples. Crates are provided, but please bring a bucket to pick into. This is always a family affair. All ages are welcome! We will pick rain or shine! The apples will be taken to the peeling garage until **Thursday, October 13th,** the day the peeling process begins. The men usually begin the peeling process, but there are always women and youth who come to help. The sides of the shelter will be dropped and canvas placed across a part of the shelter to insure comfort while sitting and working. The fireplace will be ready for fire, which always feels good as the temperature drops outside. We have special peelers up in the building near the shelter area. As they come off the peelers they are put in plastic bags and placed back in the crates and taken down to the shelter where the quartering and "cleaning up" of the apples takes place. **This step begins at 9:00 a.m. Many hands** are needed for this step. Everyone who can is encouraged to come and help, even if it's just for a couple of hours. The more help we have, the easier it is on everyone. Bring a couple of big pans and a sharp knife and maybe a comfortable chair. It really is a social event, even fun! The ladies will bring soup, hot dogs, buns, drinks and desserts to tide us over until the "hour has come" to go home.

On Friday morning, the 14th, the kettles will be set and a canopy put over the kettles to protect the precious product from leaves, etc. Next step, washing the apples, which is a very demanding job and help is always appreciated; some women have also come to help. By this time, it's time for these loyal workers to go home, get something to eat and sleep awhile before coming back around midnight to begin the cooking. All ages meet to begin the project at midnight, which is the hardest part. Lighting the fires, putting the apples in the kettles and stirring is also a demanding job! About 20-30 helpers are needed at midnight. A few brave women and the dedicated youth get in on this part and work through the night to get it all started.

Early Saturday morning, about 5:00 a.m., a hearty breakfast will be ready for all the workers. After working throughout the night on donuts and coffee, the 6:00 a.m. call to breakfast - in shifts, of course - is a welcome invitation. Everyone is welcome to eat! By this time, relief help has come to give the early crew a break. The apples are now easier to stir. The sun is up and, hopefully, it's a pleasant, sunny day to finish the process. BUT, the project must be finished, regardless of the weather. The ladies will have brought soup, hot dogs, barbecue, buns, desserts, drinks, etc. (When we work, we eat)! Lunch is usually early, so we can get the tables cleaned up and get the area cleared for the jars that will be placed on the tables, ready for filling. Through experience, at just the right time, the sugar will be added (about 100# + to each kettle!). Then at just the right time, the spices will be added and very quickly it will be ready to take off. We have two special dispensers with cut-off valves for filling the jars. There are two assembly lines and everything must be done quickly to get the apple butter in the jars and lids screwed on tight. NO jars of butter will be taken by purchaser until ALL butter has been jarred and released. This cuts down on confusion and allows for an accurate count of butter made. All apple butter taken home must be recorded by the order-taking team. There's usually "oohs and aahs" after sampling the apple butter on rolls! It's the best apple butter in the land! Just ask us – and others, too! While some people are working in the assembly line, several of the men are cleaning up the kettles as they become empty. Then everything must be cleaned up, some utensils taken up to the church as well as the orders by people who aren't there to pick it up. The project is headed by Keith Roberts & Eddie Cooper.

A big project for a small church? You bet! It takes dedicated people who want to see it carried on. We have a wonderful reputation for our apple butter and hope it will continue for many years. Let's set aside the time that it takes for this once-a-year effort and continue this project in the same united way. So many programs in our church benefit from its profits. All Apple Butter not taken on Saturday will be at the church with the order name attached and any leftover Apple Butter will be available for additional sale. Please order your Apple Butter early, as last year, leftover Apple Butter was gone in just a little over a week.


