From Our Pastor

On March 12, 2018 after much discernment, prayer, and due diligence, Burnt Factory United Methodist Church, at a properly advertized "called" church conference, decided unanimously to move forward with the purchase of the Carol McGinnis property located at 1934 Jordan Springs Road. Ms. McGinnis most graciously offered her property to the church and gave us 3 months to make a decision. She wanted the church to have first right of refusal before she placed it on the open market. She offered this wonderful property to us at \$395,000.00 which would later also be confirmed as the appraisal price. The property is directly across the road from the church and along with a very well kept brick house (circa 1801) also contains 15 acres. This purchase is set to close on May 17th.

Sisters and brothers of Burnt Factory UMC, I am constantly humbled and amazed by the faith you have displayed in moving forward with this purchase. Even with a large debt left on our expansion project, you did the hard work of prayer, study, and discernment and realized that this purchase was possible and would not interfere with our large mission output. Yes, it would be a challenge, but one that you decided was worth it. I am so very thankful to be your pastor and to be a part of this faith community that is constantly looking ahead and always desiring to do God's will, in partnership with the Holy Spirit, to build God's Kingdom on this earth!

As part of the process of planning, we decided to approach the Northwestern Virginia UMC Board of Missions for help. We filled out a grant application with a request of \$100,000.000. I was hoping for, at the very most, a grant of between \$10,000.00 and \$20,000.00. The Board looked at our mission output over the last several years and also looked at the growth and fruitfulness we have been blessed with. They considered many scenarios and came to the very affirming decision to grant to us the entire amount of \$100,000.00! Friends, this is an affirmation of your faithfulness and blessed work within the Winchester District and the Virginia Annual Conference! This is a great gift and signifies to this Pastor, the great trust that has been placed in us, as the body of Christ, to keep moving forward in mission and to keep striving to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world! God has blessed us so we can bless others! Following is my letter of gratitude that was sent to the Board. I wanted to share this with you. God bless you friends as we all continue to strive to be obedient to God through practicing radical hospitality, passionate worship, intentional faith development, risk taking mission and extravagant generosity!

CCAP, the Congregational-Community Action Project, is a cooperative ministry of 45 area churches and one synagogue serving Winchester and Frederick County that have joined together to provide financial, material and supportive assistance to people in need. CCAP is located at 112 and 106 S. Kent Street.

On Sunday, April 15, our church served lunch to over 30 CCAP clients. We served a hearty soup, bread, fruit, drinks, and desserts and provided some healthy take-away snacks. A few of the meals were delivered to the homeless camp. **This mission is done monthly at CCAP on the 3rd Sunday** as part of our Outreach Ministry. Our church has been doing this

since September and our friends at CCAP look forward to our visits. Our next Sunday Lunch will be served on May 20 starting about 12:15 at CCAP. We are usually finished by 1:30. Donna Gallagher will be the team lead for this meal. We would love to have more volunteers for preparing food and serving. If you would like to be part of the May meal at CCAP, please contact Donna at <u>d1028gal@yahoo.com</u> or 540-955-4909.

Karen Willis and I attended the quarterly CCAP meeting held on 4/20. Here are some notes from the meeting. Current Needs at CCAP:

- New or gently used work boots, non-slip black shoes, and steel toe boots. These are used by our clients at work sites.
- Swimsuits and new or gently used underwear and socks for kids, women and men.
- Men's jeans (sizes 28 thru 38) and Belts.
- Volunteers are always needed in the clothing area. We are currently looking for a manager. The clothing area is open M-Th from 8:30 to noon and Fridays from 8:30 to 11:30. My experience serving in this area has been so positive. I have made many new friends with the other volunteers and with the clients we serve. We sort and hang clothes and assist clients and just try to keep up with all the donations constantly rotating in and out of the building.
- The pantry is also looking for a manager. Their hours are M-Th 8:30 to 2:30 and Fridays from 8:30 to noon.
- A Wednesday van driver is needed to pick up food from local stores. Jimmy Grayson volunteers on Fridays doing this. Feel free to contact Jimmy if you have any questions on what this entails.
- Items needed in the pantry: Canned soups, canned meat (except for tuna), paper bowls that can be
 microwaved, Gallon size storage bags, toilet paper, laundry detergent, women's feminine items,
 sunscreen, Chap Stick, and bug spray. Tents, tarps and nylon rope are always needed at the homeless
 camp. Bed bug spray is also needed. Dollar General Stores have this spray. All donations can be dropped
 off during regular hours at CCAP. Mon-Thursday from 8:30 to 2:30 and Fridays 8:30 to noon.
- Needs in the Office: As mentioned before STAPLES' rewards and coupons are always appreciated as are donations of color paper. If you or your business has empty ink cartridges, please drop them off at Staples and mention the CCAP phone# 662-4318 and Judy Hagen and the CCAP account will be credited. An office receptionist is needed on Thursday mornings from 11:30 2:30 and Friday 8:30 11:30. If you can help out even one day a month, that would be great.
- RED WAGON Ministry: Is currently in need of size 5 diapers. Jody Stephenson is also looking for volunteers to work mornings from 8:30 to noon.

She said the Bus Tickets we send to Valley Light were very much appreciated and is helpful to them as they are trying very hard to get their life back on track. They are beginning a new business called Valley Shine. There was an Open House on April 28th.

If you shopped during the summer and bought items for the school kits we send in June, please bring them to the church and they can be put in the storage room downstairs. We'll get those all together sometime in May.

The Spring District Event was held at Braddock Street UMC on Saturday, April 28th. The "How Can I Make a Difference" speaker was the Executive Director of Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy, Kim Bobo. We can be advocates of those who often cannot speak for themselves – learn how to be of service to those in need.

Our one hour meeting was informative and interesting with the program and we're always glad to get together with fellow members and share in good food. Thanks to Donna, Christina Rohrbach, Theresa Gilbert and Allie Goode. We try to uphold the principles of the PURPOSE of United Methodist Women. Everyone was given a missionary name to pray for along with some seed packets. Plant the seeds of love! They will multiply!

We only meet every other month. Our next meeting will be June 21st with Debbie Moss as program leader and Susie Gerometta and Martha Ludtke co-hostesses. Because this is the last evening of Vacation Bible School, we may have to make some changes. More on this in the June newsletter.

Faith and Health Corner May 2018

Emotional Wellness

How you feel can affect your ability to carry out everyday activities, your relationships, and your overall mental health. How you react to your experiences and feelings can change over time. Emotional wellness is the ability to successfully handle life's stresses and adapt to change and difficult times. The following are 6 strategies for improving your emotional health.

- 1. Brighten your outlook: People who are emotionally well have fewer negative emotions and are more resilient and able to bounce back from difficulties faster. Another sign of emotional wellness is being able to hold onto positive emotions longer and appreciate the good times.
- 2. Reduce Stress: Everyone feels stressed from time to time. Stress can give you a rush of energy when it's needed most, but if stress lasts a long time (chronic stress), it becomes harmful. Learning healthy ways to cope with stress can boost your resilience. To help manage stress:
 - Get enough sleep
 - Exercise regularly
 - Set priorities
 - Think positive
- 3. Get quality sleep: To fit everything we want to do in our day, we tend to sacrifice sleep, but sleep affects both mental and physical health. It's vital to your well-being. When you're tired you can't function at your best. Sleep helps you think more clearly, have quicker reflexes and focus better.
- **4.** Cope with loss: When someone we love dies, your world changes. There is no right or wrong way to mourn. Even though the death of a loved one can feel overwhelming, most people can make it through the grieving process with the support of family and friends. To help cope with loss:
 - Take care of yourself by eating right, exercise and getting enough sleep
 - Find a support group
 - Be patient. Mourning takes time.
- 5. Strengthen social connections: Our links to others can have powerful effects on our health, both emotionally and physically.
- 6. Be mindful: The concept of mindfulness is simple. It is about being completely aware of what's happening in the present, everything that's going on inside and everything that's happening around you. It means not living your life on "autopilot." Becoming more mindful requires commitment and practice. To be more mindful:
 - Take some deep breaths
 - Enjoy a walk

Above all take care of yourself.

Pray. Intentionally let go and let God!!

As your Faith Community Nurse, I am here to serve as a bridge to better health, meeting the wholistic healing mission of the church by partnering with the Pastor as a healer of the spirit, mind and body.



Let's talk about frustration. Are you familiar with that feeling? So, my plan is to build a wooden frame to a tarp so I can drag it behind my mower to pick up leaves and sticks – better than hauling using arms and legs. Got the wood, got the tarp, need some bolts that are 2 ½ inch and two eye bolts for the chain to connect to my mower. What do I have available? 2 inch bolts and one eye bolt. Off to the hardware store. Returning from that adventure and into my project, aarrgghh, I don't have the connecting links from the eye bolts to the chain. But, I know I have them in some secret place in the shed. Back to the hardware store. Now, as I am into the project and feeling good about the plan coming together, the tarp rips.



My moment of decision has come. Give up; just deal with what I got; or do it right. Not only is this circumstance talking to me, but Jesus is too. Every one of us gets frustrated, more politely – challenged. Returning from the food store with everything but what you went for. Needing a gift bag just after you threw a bunch out. Or, your grill runs out of gas with guests waiting for their burgers. Some may label the emotion as anger, but I am holding back from that. It is a feeling of plans that don't go according to expectations. You don't get what you want.

Jesus loves us the way we are, in our brokenness. However, He doesn't want to leave us there. If we choose to follow Him, we are transformed from the inside out, but that is not an easy transformation. As we get to know Jesus, we have expectations of what He can do for us and concerns about just how much we would really need to change. We always thought if we don't actually kill someone or take something that didn't belong to us, we weren't breaking the 10 Commandments. Jesus taught that anger in your heart or to covet others' possessions was just as bad. That is really going to require change. Giving some money from your pocket is not the same as setting aside your resources to help others and build God's Kingdom. Knowing of Jesus is not the same as following Him.

Jesus challenged His early followers with these words from John's Gospel, the 6th chapter, ⁵³ Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. ⁵⁴ Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise them up at the last day." Their response: ⁶⁰ On hearing it, many of his disciples said, "This is a hard teaching. Who can accept it?" Then, in frustration, ⁶⁶ From this time many of his disciples turned back and no longer followed him.

What do you say? Do you accept Jesus by **your** terms or His? Is your commitment level to do what you can with WHAT you got; or, worse yet, to give up because it is too hard? Yes, it is hard. The only world we know does not want to follow a God of Love who expects you to be like Him. The other choice is to do the right thing. Accept the invitation, allow the transformation to happen, albeit slowly, and be like Christ. Whoever accepts Jesus as their Savior and Lord immediately begins their eternal life.

Jesus says to you and me:

³³ "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:33

Persevere through the frustration.
