
Jesus is 100% perfect in all His ways, in all He is, and in all He does!

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL APPLE BUTTER PROJECT OCTOBER 12, 2019



It's over! Talk about teamwork! 87 bushels of apples seemed to be the magic number for our people to work with this year. Thanks, Steve Cunningham, for heading up this year's project with a huge assist from Keith Roberts and Eddie Cooper and many thanks to ALL who gave so much time and energy to participate in this fundraising event sponsored by the United Methodist Men. From the Saturday, October 5th apple picking until the final kettle was power washed by Rob Moss on Saturday afternoon on the 12th, everyone felt pleased with how the entire event unfolded.

The 40 plus pickers picked from the trees and gleaned from the ground on a cool, brisk and sunny October 5th. We picked 73 bushels of beautiful Rome apples in just under an hour. Then on Thursday, October 10th, beginning at 8:30 AM the peeling began and the apples were moved down to the comfy confines of our shelter with the sides put down and a fire in the fireplace helping to make it a comfy atmosphere to work in to get all of the apples snitted and cleaned. After the damper on the fireplace was opened to clear the smoke from the shelter, we had a wonderful fellowship and plenty of good food while we snitted the day away to get finished by 7:00 PM. A long day for sure, but a wonderful group of volunteers stayed on point to get the job finished.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL APPLE BUTTER PROJECT OCTOBER 12, 2019



Several men and a couple of ladies spent Friday morning preparing the shelter for the actual making of the apple butter, washing the apples, putting up the tarps, setting the nine kettles and laying the fires. Rest was in order for the late afternoon and early evening before returning at midnight to start the process. At 3:43 AM the last of the apples were added to the kettles. Thanks to all who came and stirred during this crucial time. We had 40+ people who came at midnight to help with the stirring with many staying throughout the night. It seems that when you spread the word that help is needed, our people come and bring friends with them.

At 6:00 AM, the stirrers came to breakfast in three shifts. That is always a welcome break. Seven women fixed breakfast and fed the hungry crew a meal fit for kings and queens!!

After breakfast several all-nighters went home for some much needed rest and our numbers were a little slim. A Facebook post and an all hands email generated some help to relieve our weary morning stirrers. Just past noon they started to add the sugar and after 90 minutes all of the sugar was added. The spices were added around 1:30 PM and soon the jarring would begin. With Jason dipping and Tim carrying the 'hot butter' within a couple of hours the tables were full of the finest apple butter in the land! Our yield was 209 gallons, down from previous years, more than likely due to the dry summer keeping the moisture down in the apples. The price was \$10 per quart and \$5 per pint. Due to the smaller yield, all 209 gallons were sold with no inventory left to be sold. Some wonderful, generous church members also gave up some of their orders to help us meet all orders. We are certainly grateful to all of those who helped us to make ends meet.

The weather cooperated beautifully and everyone was pleased with how the entire process went. Things were cleaned up at the shelter, apple butter loaded, things washed up and everything finished up by 4:30 PM.

Enjoy your apple butter and feel good about being part of a project that will benefit a lot of people in so many ways. All proceeds are not in yet, but we should take in a little over \$8,000 before we take out expenses. These funds will benefit many ministries of our church. Thank you so much to everyone who participated in Apple Butter 2019. It was a lot of work, but it was also a lot of fun and fellowship!!!

From a branch on the Vine

Many years ago, my wife bought a make-up mirror; the kind that gives an "evening hue" or a "daylight glow." The special mirror provided the proper illumination for whatever the occasion may be. Was it a true reflection of what people saw? With good eyes they would see a kind and cheerful soul (that should be good for a chicken and dumplings dinner).

Everyone has mirrors in their house. Some have special mirrors that make us look thinner or taller like the carnival. Full length, bathroom, compacts - all of us are mindful of how we look; how we are put together. But what do people really see? As disciples of Christ, what do we see and what do others see when they look at us?

On noticing a homeless person, do we see a drain on society? A lazy panhandler? A person who could and should better themselves? Never mind their "story" which may be abuse, tragedy or suffering the demons of mental illness. We say this person should be a better parent or that person should make better choices on what they do to their bodies. We never see the whole picture and others never see the entire circumstances of our lives. In the Seventh chapter of Matthew's gospel, Jesus advises us "Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." Do you know enough to draw a conclusion? Form an opinion? To make a judgement? Slow those human impulses down and allow room for grace. What you are seeing is a child of God at a different place in the journey to follow Jesus. Maybe, just maybe, you are called to be a guide in that journey.

Let's turn the tables. What conclusions are people coming up with when they see you? Do they see a disciple of Christ? Perhaps the "colorful" language or the condescending attitude or the hypocritical action may present a different image than what you think you see in the mirror. What is the biggest criticism from Nonbelievers? Christians act un-Christlike. We lead others to Christ by actions that reflect our humble thanksgiving to the God who loves a broken soul (that's you and me). God loves us despite the mess we may be. It is for that mess that He sent his Son, Jesus, to make us clean and whole; to bring beauty to ashes.

What does a disciple look like? In Galatians, Paul tell us that when a person has accepted Jesus as their Savior, they are transformed, and that transformation will be evident by the fruits they bear (what people will see). *The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.* Is that what people witness in you?

I am far from perfect. Guess what? You aren't either. Welcome to the human condition that includes the imperfection of the homeless person, too. All of us have saintly qualities with a sinful nature. Do we give up? God's people may mess up, but we don't give up following and trying to obey Jesus.

Our God is wonderful; He offers us life. He forgives the mistakes and is present in every joy and sorrow. As His son or daughter, are you trying (I mean committed) to live out His will for your life? Not on the surface, but from a transformed heart. I don't know your heart; its only you and God. I don't have the right to judge you (or you me). We do have the choice to be like Jesus. Look in the mirror, do you see the person God has made you to be?
