To those Christians who are always in a hurry, here's some good advice from the 19thcentury preacher A.B. Simpson: "*Beloved, have you ever thought that someday you will not have anything to try you, or anyone to vex you again? There will be no opportunity in heaven to learn or to show the spirit of* **patience**, *forbearance, and longsuffering. If you are to practice these things, it must be now.*" Yes, each day affords countless opportunities to learn **patience**. Let's not waste them.

Commenting on our need for this virtue, M.H. Lount has said, "*God's best gifts come slowly. We could not use them if they did not. Many a man, called of God to...a work in which he is pouring out his life, is convinced that the Lord means to bring his efforts to a successful conclusion. Nevertheless, even such a confident worker grows discouraged at times and worries because results do not come as rapidly as he would desire. But growth and strength in waiting are results often greater than the end so impatiently longed for. Paul had time to realize this as he lay in prison. Moses must have asked, 'Why?' many times during the delays in Midian and in the wilderness. Jesus Himself experienced the discipline of delay in His silent years before His great public ministry began.*" God wants us to see results as we work for Him, but His first concern is our growth. That's why He often withholds success until we have learned **patience**. The Lord teaches us this needed lesson through the blessed discipline of delay.

Happy July 4th Friends –

The meeting in June had 4 in attendance. We were low in numbers, but large in fellowship. We talked about "Anger as a Caregiver." It was an opportunity to discuss anxious moments, why our family members do certain things and act a certain way. We talked about why we react at times and how we could better "pick our battles."

We touched on what comes after the anger – the dreaded "guilt." We plan to discuss a little more about the reasons why we feel guilt and how we may find peace. The following are some common causes for caregiver guilt:

- Being angry about the amount of time caring for a loved one requires, and then feeling guilty for this anger
- Resenting not having time to spend with friends and to attend favorite social activities
- Feeling as if they are letting everyone down, including their children, their employer, and the person they care for
- Being criticized by the care receiver who has unrealistic demands and expectations for the caregiver
- Believing that they should be doing more because they can't make it through their endless "to do" list each day.

The caregiver may have doubts about their role and what they are experiencing in this role. They may find themselves asking God, "why me?" Out of all my siblings and family, why am I the "chosen one?"

- Mercy, compassion, and selfless love are all behaviors that are strongly praised in the Bible. During Jesus' ministry on earth, He told the religious leaders, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice (Matthew 9:13). Mercy is a prime factor in caregiving—seeing the need of another and providing for that need.
- Compassion is a characteristic of God. Like a father to his children, God shows compassion to those who fear Him (Psalm 103:13)

Caregiving requires the ability to love selflessly, not expecting anything in return. He said, "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). Caregiving requires this kind of love. Mercy, compassion, and selfless love are not easy—in fact, humanly speaking, they are impossible to do with a completely righteous attitude (Romans 3:10-11). But God is faithful to provide strength, joy, and cheer if we ask Him. With His strength caregiving (and any other incredible feat of love) is more than possible (Mark 9:23).

I read a quote by C.S. Lewis: "We are not necessarily doubting that God will do the best for us: we are wondering how painful the best will turn out to be." Sometimes what's best is extremely painful, especially as we walk through it. Yes, it's difficult to understand sometimes. But whatever you're walking through today, remember this: God is doing what's best for you, even when it's hard to see.

Lord God, how blessed I am to be part of Your ministry to another. Thank You for allowing me to be there for my loved one, and please bless us both.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, July 14th, 2020, at 7:00 pm, in the Fellowship Hall. Our topic will be "*Overcoming Caregiver Guilt and Finding Pease.*" I look forward to seeing you. Until then –

CCAP is located at 112 and 106 S. Kent Street.

Diaper Collection: - Our church collected 2371 diapers for the CCAP diaper giveaway on June 27. Many children will be served with this kind donation. Thanks to everyone for the donations and to Penny and Tom Croll for wrapping the diapers and delivering them to CCAP. We also collected 144 Depends and 192 wipes.

Opportunities to Serve: - Even though CCAP has been closed because of COVID-19, we have been busier than ever and doing some rewarding work organizing giveaways in our community. Clients are not allowed in the buildings, so these giveaways require a lot of manpower. There are many opportunities to serve this important ministry. Please let me know if you are interested in volunteering. Several of our church members have been helping with packing food, manning the giveaways, organizing the buildings, delivery pickups and other activities. Wearing masks is a requirement and social distancing is practiced. Please reach out to me via email or phone and I will add you to our list of volunteers. I will send out emails letting you know of opportunities to serve as they arise.

<u>Van Drivers for Partner Pick Ups:</u> - We are in desperate need of volunteers who are available during the day approximately 8am-11:30am with a valid driver's license and able to load and unload. Without van drivers we are unable to start our partner pick-ups again. The Van runs 7 days a week, but you can volunteer for one day a week (or more if you want). We are looking for van drivers and back-up drivers (to be on call in event someone is out). Please pass the word, this is an immediate need for us and one of the most important. Please let me know if you are interested in being a driver. A regular license is required not a CDL.

<u>Lunch at CCAP – 3rd Sunday:</u> - In June, Karen Willis and her team packed and served 52 chicken dinners at CCAP. Because of Covid19, we are packaging the meals in our Fellowship Hall and giving them to clients outside of CCAP. Thanks to **everyone** who provided food and helped serve. Our next serving day is July 19. We will meet at the church at 11 to begin packing the lunches, then drive to CCAP to serve. Contact Donna Gallagher at 540-431-9027 if you would like to contribute in any way.

Special Notes: - CCAP does accept on-line donations. If you would like to make a donation, please go to ccapwinc.org. Also, a big **THANK YOU** to Stonewall Ruritans for donating milk for giveaways. The milk and the deliveries were very much appreciated.

Please keep this ministry in your prayers as we make plans to reopen safely.
