Penny also gave a report on how Project Esperanza is coping with COVID. They are the only school in Puerto Plata that has been receiving kids all year. They are taking all the precautions and following protocol to keep the kids and teachers safe.

The cost of the workshop (you supply the yarn) is \$25.00. Lisa will teach us all the steps we need to make a warm and cozy blanket and all of the proceeds will go to our team. Make sure that you get 8 oz. chunky yarn (make sure it's 8 oz. chunky yarn and at least 28 yards). You will need 6 skeins to make a 40×50 " blanket. Please make sure to let one of us know if you are interested and we will definitely let you know when we re-schedule the workshop.

When we believe and practice the key truths found in scripture, we can experience God's peace instead of anxiety and other negative and harmful emotions.



Life can feel like a wilderness - too big, not enough resources, isolated, far away from where we want to be. Our pandemic experience certainly magnifies this sensation; yet even there the good news reaches us that God is coming and for that I am truly grateful.



Top Ten Things Caregivers To Start Doing for The New Year

- 1. Keep records of all medications and reactions: make notes about what works, what doesn't and when you informed the physician of any problems.
- 2. Keep records of all doctor appointments: the reason for the visit, the doctor's responses to your concerns, any procedures performed, etc.
- 3. Plan for the unexpected: discuss plans and wishes of everyone involved in the caregiving family. Talk about final resting places and what arrangements your family want.
- 4. Have an Advance Directive filled out and given to the primary physician and all relatives who may need the form.
- 5. Have a Last Will and Testament completed or updated: without a signed Will, the courts will decide how to distribute the possessions of your loved ones. This should be done while your family member is still able to explain to you their wishes and understands what they are signing and agreeing to.
- 6. Record all monetary involvements: investments, resources creditors, debtors, business transactions, etc.
- 7. Have an insurance analysis done: is your home, life and health insurance still appropriate for your family's needs? What about the insurance policies of your loved ones? Do you all have enough coverage to take care of any eventuality? Do you have provisions for Long Term Care? For respite care? Is your house adequately covered given the state of the weather patterns?
- 8. Clean out the medicine chest. Look for expiration dates on all medicine, and check with your doctor about previous medications which will either be harmful with current prescriptions or which are no longer effective for your loved one. Not only will you save space, you might also save a life.


A Fish Story from Buddy from years gone by:

Outreach Summary for 2020




As we look back over the Outreach Projects of 2020, we rejoice and thank God for the many ways that Burnt Factory has been present in the community and beyond. It has been a challenging year for so many in our community -- illness, loss of income, food insecurity, virtual learning, depression – and in response, our Outreach team worked with your generous giving so that we could share your blessings with those struggling. We followed the Bishop's direction on volunteering and the procedures on social distancing and wearing masks so that we could return to volunteering in the community. Here is a list of some of the areas that you have been the hands and feet of Christ:

- Highland Food Pantry received a monetary donation of \$500.
- Outreach worked with the Faithseekers Sunday School class to provide Fremont Street Nursery with 15 weekend bags of food, when they were open. (Fremont closed for COVID March 20-June 8.) Outreach also worked with the Faithseekers to provide Fremont with non-perishable items for 30 Thanksgiving baskets and 30 Christmas baskets.
- WATTS was provided supplies and volunteers to prepare dinner off-site and to serve those meals to the homeless men and women sheltering at First UMC during our week following Thanksgiving.
- \$1500 annual donation to WATTS and additional \$200 to WATTS warming shelter at Market Street UMC
- \$500 donation to Greenwood Mill Elementary Bright Futures (We were unable to provide volunteers.)
- Collection of school supplies for Bright Futures "Stuff the Bus" in August value +\$650
- \$1000 donation to the Salvation Army to help with the increase need for meals and for the December Red Kettle collection. (We were unable to provide bell ringers this year.) We also shared our food pantry items.
- 11 Christmas meals for Social Services
- Collections in February and October for Laurel Center value +\$900
- Collection in July of snacks and cleaning supplies for Evans Home for Children value +\$600
- CCAP--
- Lunches served the third Sunday of each month to an avg. of 44 guests
- Collected 23 Easter baskets value +\$325 (CCAP closed, donated to UMM for Fremont Street Nursery)
- 32 complete Thanksgiving dinners value +\$950
- Various underclothing items collected in January value +\$500
- Diapers collected in June value +\$700
- Blankets and diapers collected during Thanksgiving week value +\$1000
- \$3000 annual donation
- \$2250 annual donation to Project Esperanza in the Dominican Republic plus additional \$1000 from designated mission funds to cover the cancellation of the Roast Beef Dinner fundraiser
- \$350 contribution to help save Colegio Costambar from closing (A high school used by Project Esperanza.)
- Relay for Life event was cancelled, however, the Believers raised +\$4600
- Quarterly participation at Jubilee Kitchen, third Saturday of the month
- Financial help for several local families and Christmas gifts and groceries for a 4-year-old and his family
- Overnight mission trips were cancelled; however, several volunteers took on CCAP and WATTS as their local mission fields
- UMMen, UMWomen, Adult Sunday School Classes, Children and Youth, and many others in our church family continue to reach out into the community and support various mission projects and collections
- \$10,000 to various support ministries and individual assistance from Pastor's discretionary fund
- \$20,000 in apportionment mission initiatives
- \$1,000 in Conference offerings toward mission

CCAP is located at 112 and 106 S. Kent Street.

Our first CCAP Day for 2021 is on Sunday, January 24. The Outreach Committee is collecting Men's thermal tops and bottoms sizes LARGE and above. Thermals are essential items for those who spend their days and nights outside. Thermal donations can be left in the CCAP Bin at church.

We served 50 chicken dinners at our CCAP lunch in December. Thanks so much to Cheryl and Mark Jones and their team for this meal. It was a hearty meal served with love and prayer. Our next Sunday lunch will be January 17. Because of Covid-19 restrictions, we are serving outside at CCAP and preparing the meals off-site. We will start packing the meals at 11am and should be finished serving by 1. Hope Owens will be the team lead for this meal. *THE STOOP

Today is a day filled with many emotions. Today was my last day at CCAP, an amazing faith-filled ministry. I turned my keys in today. Everyone had gone for the day and I was to let myself out the back door when finished with some paperwork.

As the door shut and I heard the click, it was like a dagger in my heart. I began to walk towards my car, but then I saw him. One of my dear homeless friends, who called a nearby stoop his home. Over the 7 years, we became best of friends. We have had a lot of laughs together, a lot of frustrating moments and even tears together as he is battling liver failure. When he learned of my cancer diagnosis he would always tell me he was praying for me. As crazy as the homeless folks would drive me crazy, I would worry about them. As I would be sitting at home looking out my window and seeing the snow swirling, I would think of them and their plights and struggles. I would think of the families that were facing evictions, those that could not pay their utility bills, or were in need of food.

I can remember pre COVID days. We would welcome the homeless into the lobby during those cold wintry and rainy days. Often a coffee pot would be brought out into the lobby along with treats that we would find out back. I cannot tell you how many nights my dear friend Frances would stay there late so they did not have to be out in the elements. Back in the day, Miss Fran Ricketts would have them sleep in the lobby if the beds were full at Watts or if it was a family as Watts would not have housing for families or those with pets--yes she allowed pets in too. SHHH, no one knew her little secrets. Even though we were not an official shelter, Miss Fran would make a way. There were many huddles in that office. Frances and I would bow our heads and pray for the Lord to make a way for many situations. I was known as the Marshmallow because I had such a soft spot in my heart for people. I sit here laughing as I am typing this as along the way I did start to toughen up a bit!

A family of five showed up at the door today. They had a fire in their home last night. They only had the clothes on their backs. Tracey and I went over to the clothing house to fill bags with donated items to help clothe the family. I often think when I first became Vice President and asked Frances what I could help her with and she stated she wanted me to be in charge of clothing and the clothing house! Good Lord help me! I can remember the mound of clothes taking up half the room! The Lord always blessed us at CCAP. Let me tell you being in charge of clothing, broke my shopping addiction at Belk!

In my early days at CCAP, I started as a Receptionist, then became a Financial Interviewer, then VP, and ended with being the Executive Director. There were so many stories told over that desk in the interview office. Many times, the family members would cry as they shared their struggles and their stories. The Lord blessed me with the gift of praying for people. I would reach for their tired worn hands and pray away. Friendships were formed. When they would come for their monthly food, they would stop by to say hello and give me an update on how they were doing.

Many a morning the lobby would be overflowing with the homeless and our regular clients waiting to go back to the pantry, maybe see the interviewer, or waiting to go over to the clothing house. So many of us take for granted the privilege of having money to go to the grocery store, the local mall and the finances to pay our utility bills. I was a single mom who raised three children and knew what it was like to be in need. I had a loving family and friends who made sure we never went without. For a large part of our client base, CCAP is their family. We are the one they turn to when in need. Throughout the years, there would be home visits made or emergency deliveries made. Prayers would be offered up time and time again. I can remember both Miss Fran and Frances teaching me when we need something we need to pray, the Lord will bring it to us. I saw this happen over and over again. The cost of turkeys was \$4,800. Someone donated \$3,000 and then another check followed for \$1,800! The exact amount! Food, clothing, and financial assistance would continue to flood our ministry. Of course people would get upset about some situations and think people were just using us or misabusing the items they received such as selling them at the local flea market. We would always say everything that comes in the door belongs to the Lord. It is between them and the Lord. We just need to do what he has called us to do.

Holidays were so special at CCAP. Our warehouse would be busting at the seams with food for Thanksgiving. Frances had a unique and special way of getting food donations for Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving was Miss Fran's favorite holiday. As she continued to serve even when she was ill, she would come down and bundle up and greet the clients who had been waiting in line for hours to receive their Thanksgiving meal. Christmas giveaways were unreal. I can remember the Christmas at Mount Carmel Church. You could not find an empty space on the floor to put any items. At Easter, the lobby would be filled with baskets wrapped so delicately, filled with candy and toys for the little ones. The churches, organizations, and individual donors would always bless us so we could bless those in need.

Then came 2020. All things changed. Due to COVID we could no longer have clients and families in our buildings. We had to get creative with how we could continue our services.

Again I chuckle as I reflect back, with my blood work numbers being low due to chemo, I had to stay a distance when there was big giveaways. I got a frantic call from my dear friend Crystal, our volunteer coordinator, Robin we need to call the police to come help us. We were attempting to do a drive up giveaway and we had jammed traffic on Cork and Kent Street. People were shouting and horns blowing--quite the scene! The team carried on and many were blessed. Since drive thru's were challenging. We got creative and we headed to the neighborhoods with food and supplies.

Oh the fun we had! I can remember driving the blue van up a hill thinking we were not going to make it as it was loaded down with the milk. We would pull into a neighborhood and get on the bull horns to announce that CCAP was there to bless them. Some families did not know who we were and would ask why we were there? Our response--to bring food, love and hope.

We started to do financial assistance remotely. For the clothing house. The families would come to the main lobby and complete their forms of what they needed and our volunteers would fill the order. Our food distribution was being done out the back door.

In learning from one of our dear Board members, Bob Boulter, we must remember the relational ministry piece during this trying time. How are we going to connect with families during these troubled times?

As my friend and I stood saying good-bye with the town run, flowing swiftly behind us, I recalled the day they found a gentleman floating in town run. It made me think of how fleeting life is. If you would have told me on January 1, 2020 I would be diagnosed with breast cancer, then weeks after being diagnosed, I would become the leader of a nonprofit ministry and learn to lead them through the beginning of a Pandemic, I would have thought you crazy! These past 10 months have made me realize any one of us could end up on a stoop. Many families are one pay check away from becoming homeless, many families are living without heat, many are struggling with putting food on their table. There are many that are bound in addictions and lost. There is a battle of mental illness going on in many lives.

The one comforting thing to many has been that humble yellow abode located on 112 South Kent Street known as CCAP. We may not have the fanciest building, our ceiling tiles may be faded brown, our floors may be crooked, but we provide love, hope, faith, hugs (now airless) and so much more.

It has been a blessing to be a part of the 45th year of CCAP and the last 7 years. I cannot begin to thank all of you, my friends, family, churches, volunteers and my dear clients for your support and prayers and for being a part of the CCAP Family. The CCAP family is very dear and near to me. I know the Lord is looking down at us and saying Well done my good and faithful servants. You are all amazing in all you do! Thank you for all you have done to make a difference in other people's lives.

May 2021 be a blessing for all of you. Always remember when the Lord gives you vision, he gives provision. Remember-that next person standing at the door in need just may be Jesus! Will you answer the knock? May we never judge and no matter where we are in life may we always be the light and hands and feet of Jesus.
