

5 Important Legal Documents for Caregivers

Getting the legal stuff done now benefits everyone

One day your older adult won't be able to manage their own legal matters and will rely on you to act in their best interest. Planning ahead and getting the legal stuff squared away before a crisis allows your older adult and your family to stay in control of critical decisions. The downside to not having proper legal paperwork in place is being forced to allow lawyers and courts to get involved in family matters.

Legal basics for caregivers

There's a lot for caregivers to manage, so we've narrowed the list to the 5 most important legal documents. This list doesn't cover every situation and shouldn't be considered legal advice, but it will help you cover the basics.

- 1. Power of attorney (POA)
 - This allows your older adult to authorize someone to make legal decisions when they are no longer competent.
 - POA also covers authority to make financial decisions
- 2. Durable power of attorney for health care (also known as a health care proxy)
 - This allows your older adult to authorize someone to make all decisions regarding health care, including choosing health care providers, medical treatment, and end-of-life decisions.
 - This power only goes into effect when your older adult is unable to make decisions for themselves.
- 3. Living will or advance directive
 - This allows your older adult to state, in advance, what kind of medical care they do and do not want to receive. This also covers what life-support procedures they would not like to have.
 - This is used when a person isn't able to make their wishes known on their own.
- 4. Living Trust
 - This allows your older adult (the grantor) to create a trust and appoint someone (a trustee) to manage the trust assets when they aren't able to manage their finances.
 - A person or financial institution can be the trustee.
- 5 Will
 - Your older adult will name an executor and beneficiaries.
 - The executor is the person who will manage your older adult's estate at the time of death.
 - Beneficiaries will receive the estate at the time of death.

What happens if you don't plan ahead?

If no planning is done before your older adult becomes incapacitated, family members must ask a court to appoint a conservator or guardian. A conservatorship can be difficult for families because almost every action or decision on behalf of your older adult must be court supervised and approved.

How to get started with legal documents?

For legal matters, hiring an elder law attorney is always recommended. It's also smart to do your own research so you understand what's happening. In addition, you can usually seek help on these issues from social workers or clergy. While they cannot advise you legally, they may be able to assist you in finding the appropriate legal professional.



Here we are already looking at August! When you read this four of us will have attended Montague Avenue UWF for their Potato/Salad Bar/Dessert meal followed by their Candle Burning Ceremony. In the past, it has been a great time of food, fellowship, and remembrance of those we choose to honor. It was held Thursday, July 28th. It is a model for our own Candle Burning ceremony that we will have for our August 18th meeting in our fellowship hall. Montague Avenue is our district prayer partner group.

We can soon start shopping to see what the bargains are for the school supplies we buy for the kits that we will assemble next June. When you are out look for: packs of notebook paper,

70-page spiral notebooks, boxes of 24 crayons, unsharpened pencils, handheld pencil sharpeners, children's blunt scissors, 2-inch erasers and rulers. Bring them to the fellowship hall and they will be stored down in the storage room until we sort through them in May to see if we have enough supplies for 50 school kits that we normally send. We need 150 spiral notebooks since each kit must contain three. We also need 180 pencils.

We will have a list of all the local schools that we can pray for. We want to keep the safety of the children and staff in our prayers. That list will be ready for our August meeting.

The District UWF Officers are planning a Celebration event at our shelter on Saturday, August 20th from 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. Seven from our unit attended an event they planned down there last year. Hopefully, more members will attend this year from all over the district! Since it is at our facility, let's make every effort to support this as we see friends we haven't seen for a while and enjoy what they have planned.

Please plan to attend our August 18th meeting. Karen Willis and Polly will have the Candle Burning Ceremony and Regina Baldwin will be our hostess. We will also check off what we have done on our "Living Into Our Faith" form and hear the latest progress of Project Esperanza.

WHAT'S GOING ON IN THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH?

Regarding the division that our denomination is experiencing, I thought it would be appropriate to share what Church Council has placed in the minutes. I hope it provides some answers and some peace and comfort. I plead with you all, do not listen to false claims, half-truths and lies about our beloved United Methodist Church. We have always welcomed all people to our church, and we always will. We have always ministered to anyone and everyone who is seeking Christ. We love people, all people! We will always defend the faith and the core doctrines of the church.

For now, the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee along with the Church Council has voted to make our stance here at Burnt Factory UMC to be one that embraces patience and prayer and that seeks to wait upon the decisions of the 2024 General Conference to delve into what Burnt Factory's decisions may or may not be on our future. Following is the exact language of our stance as unanimously voted upon on June 8, 2022, by the Church Council of Burnt Factory UMC. We will continue to obey the Book of Discipline <u>as written</u> and as we always have.

*I hope to schedule a "Town Hall" meeting soon to answer to the best of my knowledge and ability any questions anyone may have regarding any particulars regarding the division or splintering of our UMC.

OUR BFUMC STANCE ON THE STATE OF THE DENOMINATION

Until the General Conference convenes in 2024 and ratifies decisions regarding the issues that seek to divide the church, specifically full LGBTQ inclusion status, it is Burnt Factory's official stance/position/statement to remain United Methodists at this particular juncture.

Rationale 1: Nothing has changed. Regardless of the news, innuendo's, falsehoods, in-fighting, half-truths and propaganda we may hear, The Book of Discipline, remains exactly the same as it has been regarding the doctrine and rules/laws pertaining to marriage and ordination.

Rationale 2: Only the General Conference can change The Book of Discipline. Until such time, it would be detrimental and potentially disastrous, in our opinion, to the mission and ministry of BFUMC and to the fruitful and faithful contributions we are making to our community.

When and if the time comes that the Book of Discipline is changed in such a way that theological truths and traditional interpretations of scripture are deemed to be compromised by the majority of church membership; it is at that time, we will enter into holy conversation seeking God's will. It is at that time; the Church Council would discern if a vote is called for. It is at that time we would take appropriate actions and decisions as voted upon by the full membership of the church to either remain United Methodists or disaffiliate. Until that day, we will stay the course and be a non-anxious and faithful body of believers that are focused on doing God's work and worshipping our Lord Jesus Christ in spirit and truth.

Fitting In

I'm thinking today about our children starting a new school year in a few weeks, especially those starting Middle and High School. They are facing so many changes all the while just trying to fit in.

Learning to fit in is becoming increasingly important at ever younger ages experts say. Fortunately parents can do a good bit to help. Although the importance of parents in an adolescent's life is documented in many studies, "social scientists are suggesting that the focus of children's identity is shifting from the family to their peer groups at an ever-younger age." Youth need attention if they are susceptible to adolescent depression, drug abuse, or violent cliques, wannabes, middle school friendship circles, and loners. For information about what you can do to help your child, I would recommend a book by Patricia Adler, "Peer Power: Preadolescent Culture and Identity." All research shows that a one on one connection with an adult, a parent, a teacher or a coach is ten times more powerful an influence than peers.

The Friendly Neighborhood FREEDGE officially opened in June. FREEDGE is a shared outreach aiming to reduce food insecurity and food waste in our area with a goal of building a stronger community. The hope is to promote healthy eating through the installation of this public refrigerator. The Fridge is located on the Our Health Campus and is open 24 hours a day. Those who are struggling financially can take whatever they need to feed themselves and their families. Volunteers are needed to keep the Freedge clean. Cleaning supplies are stored at the site in a locked drawer. If you, a group of friends, your family, a Sunday School Class, or anyone would like to take a week and be responsible for cleaning the FREEDGE, go to the sign-up Genius on the ccapwinchester.org website to sign up.

May I submit to you an idea of submission? The mention of the word invokes definitions of *give in, back down, capitulate*. In our recent study of the fifth chapter of Ephesians, we had to come to terms with words from Paul: *Submit to one another out of reverence to Christ*. In the entirety of the bible, would Jesus want us to accept evil actions for the sake of unity? I don't think so. How should the church get along in unity of Spirit? We are to use our gifts and graces to bring others into relationship with Jesus and to serve others in his name. We submit to Christ as our Lord and from that we submit to (recognize) the parts of the body and the roles they have so that the church functions at its best in its mission.

We have some great sewers in our church that make baby blankets and shawls for those in need. I am not one of them, and I submit to their authority (or giftedness). They can do it better than I can. I do know a thing or two about administration (certainly not all); so, other members of the church let me use my gifts to help the body be better. What does Paul say in *Romans 12*:

form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us. If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully.

We submit to others and their given gifts so as to empower the church, the body, to serve Christ. We are not giving in; we are giving over to the direction of Christ as found through the members of the church and their gifts. It may be a blow to our ego, but it is not about each of us; it is about all of us as One Body. We need each part to humbly fulfill their purpose so that the purpose of the church is fulfilled.

To submit is also to give grace and mercy to others. Remember, we are all One Body. Would you cut of your nose because it smelled a skunk or poke out your eye because it doesn't see 20/20 anymore? Friends, we aren't perfect. Can we acknowledge (submit) that people are trying - and cut them some slack (grace)? Perfection doesn't exist in the complex and wonderful human beings we are. There's a little saying you may be familiar with, "forgive others as you are forgiven." Not just words, but a mandate for the character of a follower of Christ.

Submit is to love. Love revealed by marveling at the gifts God has bestowed to all of us and love in the reality we don't always get it right. Love is being like Jesus.
