

November is Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month

Pancreatic cancer is the 10th most commonly diagnosed cancer in the U.S. It begins when abnormal cells in the pancreas grow and divide out of control and form a tumor. The pancreas is located deep in the abdomen, between the stomach and the spine. It makes enzymes that help digestion and hormone that control blood-sugar levels.

More than 62,000 Americans are expected to be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in 2022. That is 170 people diagnosed every day. Pancreatic cancer's exact causes are not well understood. About 10% of pancreatic cancers are considered familial or hereditary. Most pancreatic cancer happens randomly or is caused by things such as smoking, obesity and age.

This type of cancer is often detected late, spreads rapidly, and has a poor prognosis. Pancreatic cancer may cause only vague unexplained symptoms. Pain (usually in the abdomen or back), weight loss, jaundice (yellowing of the skin and/or eyes) with or without itching, loss of appetite, nausea, change in stool, pancreatitis and recent-onset diabetes are symptoms that may indicate pancreatic cancer. If you are experiencing one or more of these symptoms, please speak to your doctor. Treatment may include surgically removing the pancreas, radiation, and chemotherapy.

Hand Washing

Until 100 years ago, the link between hand washing and the transmission of disease was unknown. Now, we know that simple hand washing is one of the most effective weapons against disease. Washing your hands not only protects others from germs you might pass on, but protects you as well.

The link between hand washing and the spread of germs was not recognized by physicians until the early 1900's. Prior to that time, some of the resistance to hand washing sprang from the association of water and disease, such as malaria and typhoid fever. Also, with the lack of indoor plumbing, the act of hand washing was not a simple matter. Water had to be drawn and carried in, and then heated. Luckily, we live in an age where keeping our hands clean is a simple matter. "Hand washing is the single most important means of preventing the spread of infection," according to the Center for Disease Control (CDC).

While knowledge is a wonderful thing, it doesn't help us unless we put it into practice. In hospitals, where the value of clean hands is well known, current estimates by the CDC state that 5 - 15% of all hospital patients will acquire a secondary infection during their hospital stay. A hospital is not the only place where the practice of hand washing needs to be constant. Day care centers, nursing homes, and restaurants are places where good hand hygiene is a must.

In this day of running water and soap being available virtually everywhere, it is surprising that we still see unacceptable numbers of people being infected because germs were carried from one person to another on contaminated hands. Infections from mishandled food, including Salmonella infections, affect over 80 million people a year in the United States alone! The knowledge of infection control and the ready availability of soap and water are a beginning, but they give us no protection when people don't use them.

This handy list comes from the web site, Kidshealth.org, and gives invaluable tips for keeping yourself and those around you healthy.

Wash your hands:

- After using the bathroom
- After blowing your nose or coughing into your hand

- Before eating, serving, or preparing food
- After touching pets or animals
- After outdoor activities
- Before and after visiting someone who is sick
- When your hands are dirty
- After changing a diaper

Hand washing must be done correctly to be of value. Rinsing your hands under water for a few seconds does **not** count!! Start with warm water, and use soap. Antibacterial soap is not needed for everyday hand washing. Rub your hands together, covering all surfaces, including nail beds. Friction is a great tool for dislodging germs and sending them down the drain. Keep this up for 15-20 seconds about the time it takes to say The Lord's Prayer. Rinse well, and if you are in a public restroom use a paper towel to touch the faucet and toilet handles, and also the door out of the rest room. Many people have touched these surfaces before you, and you can bet they didn't all wash their hands first. When soap and water are not available, the waterless hand gels and wipes are a good choice.

Protect yourself - Wash Your Hands!




Now, that's one clean turkey...

- Thank God for the people that are in our lives. We can acknowledge God's blessings as we enjoy a meal with friends and family.

CCAP Corner

November 2022



CCAP is a cooperative effort of individuals, civic groups, businesses, and religious communities in Winchester and Frederick County. They have unified to provide financial, material, and supportive assistance in a loving way. Even with the help of existing social service programs, CCAP clients are unable to meet their needs and responsibilities. CCAP's desire is to do God's work in a world where many basic human needs are simply not met.

Collections for CCAP at Burnt Factory UMC – November is a busy month for CCAP collections! We will continue our traditional giving to CCAP as follows:

- We are currently collecting food for the Thanksgiving giveaway being held on November 19th at CCAP. We will have 20 complete meals including turkeys. Thanks to all who are participating in this collection.
- Healing Service on 11/16 We will collect diapers for the Red Wagon ministry and blankets for CCAP at this service. Sizes 4, 5, and 6 of diapers are the most needed. Requested blanket sizes are Full and Queen.

In October, CCAP celebrated its 48th Birthday with an Open House and ribbon cutting at the newly renovated Clothing House. WOW! 48 years of serving an everchanging clientele and need. This has taken a lot of dedication from CCAP leaders, our local churches and community, and our loyal volunteers.

At our quarterly Representative/Board Mtg held in October, Andrea Cosans, the Exec. Director at CCAP, reported we've had a 20% increase in the number of clients we serve. CCAP is currently doing two Mobile Food Ministries a month in addition to the food given away daily at CCAP. Clothing is open 3 days/week and financials help clients daily.

The Friendly Neighborhood FREEDGE is open 24 hours a day for all to enjoy. If you are going out of town and have some fresh produce or items you do not want to go to waste, bring them down and share it with our community. Some examples of items are: fresh fruits and vegetables, granola, cheese, prepackaged sandwiches and yogurt. It is located at 419 N Cameron St, and you can stop and drop off your items directly to the refrigerator at any time. You can also sign up to be part of a cleaning crew for a day or a week; whatever works with your schedule. 
