Youth meetings and mission work are essential to building these relationships. Meetings will consist of doing a devotional together, activities (games and/or crafts), and of course food! These times of getting together are essential for young people to feel they have a "safe space" and friends they can connect with about anything going on in their lives. The middle/high school years are when teenagers experience all emotions (joy, sadness, anger, etc.) on a more intense level. Youth group is a place for teens to feel safe, feel heard, form friendships, and most important grow in their relationship with God. Mission work is important as it is a way to reach others in need within a safe and structured environment. It teaches teamwork, the value of long-term planning, and the joy and satisfaction of helping others in very practical ways.

Healthy Living for Stronger Faith Connect to God with Your Whole Self

As God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. Colossians 3:12, 14

Our faith doesn't just connect us to God with our spirits but as whole beings. How do all the areas of your life connect you to God?

FAITH LIFE

What feeds your faith life? Often, we ignore the very practices that contribute to a healthy life. Write down three ways that you connect to your faith and make it a goal to practice each at least one time in the next month.

MEDICAL

Taking preventive action now can ward off bigger problems later. In an annual wellness visit, bring up questions to better understand how to support your own medical health as a beloved child of God.

MOVEMENT

Moving is a fantastic way to connect to the grace of the human body. Move more with a solodance party in the kitchen, helping a child in your life practice a favorite sport, or taking your dog or a friend's for an extended walk while praising God for the marvelous way He created you.

WORK

Honor health in God's calling by taking a few minutes in your work day to practice a short gratitude meditation for your abilities or offer encouragement for a coworker's talents during a walking break.

EMOTIONAL

If you start to feel anxious or depressed, monitor your feelings. If your mood doesn't improve within a few weeks and it starts to impact your daily life, consider talking to a counselor,

reaching out to your support system, or even just checking out a self-help book to practice positive coping skills.

NUTRITION

Consider starting a lunch group that brings together body and spirit! By having four or five people rotate bringing a home-cooked lunch one day a week, you will get to know people better and encourage each other in healthy eating choices.

FRIEND & FAMILY

Get out of the digital world and intentionally connect with the people in your life. Ask questions face to face. Then practice listening for understanding, not judgment.

Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

Cervical cancer is a disease in which cancer cells arise in the cervix, which connects the uterus to the vagina. HPV is almost always the cause of cervical cancer, which is why vaccines against the virus are an important part of cervical cancer prevention strategies.

The U. S. FDA has approved three vaccines - Gardisil, Gardisil 9, and Cervarix - that prevent infection with certain subtypes of HPV including 16 and 18, two high-risk HPVs that cause some 70% of cervical cancers.

If vaccination programs with these new-generation vaccines are effectively implemented, approximately 90% of invasive cervical cancer cases worldwide could be prevented, in addition to the majority of precancerous lesions.

Usually, cervical cancer develops slowly over time, and another powerful preventive measure is Pap test screening, a procedure during which cells are collected from the surface of the cervix and examined. The Pap test can both detect cancer at an early stage, when treatment outcomes tend to be better, and detect precancerous abnormalities, which can then be treated to prevent them from developing into cancers.

Project Esperanza primarily (but by no means exclusively) serves the Haitian refugee and immigrant population of Puerto Plata, Dominican Republic in the areas of education, social aid, and community development.

2022 Year End Activities (Excerpts from the December Sponsor Newsletter)

• The semester ended on December 20th with class parties and a potluck dinner with the teachers. They will remain on break until after Epiphany and resume classes on January 10th.









• For the 8th year, Morehouse College in Atlanta visited the week of December 10-16 to share in the year end activities. They brought donations so students could choose a prize for good attendance, led daily games at the educational farm and painted a new mural at the school. They also helped to fund and participate in a construction project at the high school, Colegio Costambar.



• Students have been working hard in math and many have completed their entire workbook!









- In Haiti, after President Jovenel Moise's assassination on July 7, 2021, the capital has become quite unlivable for most, due to gang activity. The majority of schools in the entire country have still not opened yet this year. Gangs are equipped by powerful men who use vulnerable youth to lead kidnappings and other horrific crimes for their own benefit. Gangs currently fight for territory and have displaced thousands through their actions. Stories circulate about heart wrenching murders of young men who refuse to join gangs or who support the police in uncovering gang activity. We wish we had the power to do more. We periodically send funds to two schools in Haiti and hope to do more in the future. There is a current urgent need to help support the students nutritionally at one of the schools (outside the capital in the north) that is currently able to hold classes. We also continue to work to provide the best services we can to those who have sought refuge here in Puerto Plata.
- As of December 28, 2022 112 out of 250 students have been sponsored for school year 2022-23 which started September 19th. Will you help Caitlin achieve her goal of having all students sponsored this year? As little as \$15/month (\$180 per year) can help a child attend school.

Thank you for your continued love, support and prayers for Caitlin and her teachers who are working in the DR to help families find a better life through education. Burnt Factory has made Project Esperanza a signature ministry of the church and generously donates \$2,700 each year to support 15 students at Level 1 so they can attend the school. If you feel led to individually sponsor a child, there are 3 levels of support:

Level 1 - an annual donation of \$180 which covers daily lunch, a uniform shirt, and some materials.

Level 2 - a monthly donation of \$30 which covers daily lunch, a uniform shirt, some materials, and contribution to the teacher's salary. (May be paid annually - \$360)

Level 3 - a monthly donation of \$50 which covers daily lunch, a uniform shirt, some materials, contribution to teachers' salaries, and contribution to the facilities and educational farm field trips. (May be paid annually - \$600)

CCAP is a cooperative effort of individuals, civic groups, businesses, and religious communities in Winchester and Frederick County. They have unified to provide financial, material, and supportive assistance in a loving way. Even with the help of existing social service programs, CCAP clients are unable to meet their needs and responsibilities. CCAP's desire is to do God's work in a world where many basic human needs are simply not met.

Our first <u>CCAP Collection Day</u> for 2023 is on Sunday, January 22. The Outreach Committee is collecting new Men's thermal underwear and new men's and women's winter gloves. Thermal tops and bottoms are needed for men in size medium through 3X; medium and large are the most in demand. Thermals and gloves are essential items for those who spend their days and nights outside and for those working out in the cold. Donations may be left in the CCAP Bin in the Narthex through Sunday, January 22.

Food Box Packing - If you're looking for a fun, productive way to spend an hour and a half; come join us on the first Monday each month at 5:30 to pack food boxes. A little over an hour is all it takes to pack enough boxes for several days of food giveaways at CCAP. During this time of work and fellowship, we share stories, prayers, and lots of laughter. Please let me or anyone on Outreach know if you would like to help out.

<u>Opportunities to Serve</u> – There are many ways to volunteer your time at CCAP. Go to <u>www.ccapwinchester.org</u> and click on the donate/volunteer tab at the top of the page for a description of the many opportunities to share your talents and time. You can also reach out to me or anyone on the Outreach Team if you have any questions about what we do as volunteers at CCAP.

Remember, <u>The Neighborhood FREEDGE</u> is open 24 hours a day. If you have extra, fresh produce or items you do not want to go to waste, bring them down and share it with our community. Some examples of items are: fresh fruits and vegetables, granola, cheese, prepackaged, purchased sandwiches and yogurt. The FREEDGE is located at 419 N Cameron St, and you can drop off your items directly to the refrigerator at any time. You can also sign up to be part of a cleaning crew for a day or a week; whatever works with your schedule. 
SAVE THE DATE

Thank God we don't live in Buffalo, and thank God we aren't suffering in the midst of a war like Ukraine. Yes, thank God for these and so many other things. He is a good God, right? But, let me ask, "Is God good?"

A simple answer. Sure, He is, just like my Mom who made so many meals and helped me with homework; or like the random stranger who helped load lumber at Lowes. Are people on the same level of good as God is? We throw the word "good" around in so many situations. Good day, goodnight, goodbye, good job, good riddance, a good life, good to go. There are many different meanings of "good" and somehow none can adequately describe God. Yes, many people are good, but only God is the definition of good.

As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?""Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. "No one is good—except God alone. Mark 10:17-18

At 35, he became the youngest person to win the Nobel Peace prize. He was assassinated on April 4, 1968, while making a speech from the balcony of his hotel room in Memphis, Tennessee.

"The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands in times of challenge and controversy." — Martin Luther King Jr.

On this day, we remember those prophets like Martin Luther King Jr. who called God's people to be holy as he is holy, and today we press on in full faith that God will do it (1 Thess 5:24).

Friday, January 6th is the **Feast of the Epiphany**, also called *Three Kings Day*. Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar were the three kings from the Orient. They are also known as the Three Wise Men or the Three Magi. The three wise men were merchants who saw the star over Bethlehem when Christ was born. They followed the star, to find the Christ child lying in the manger on January 6th. They brought the Christ child gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

The word "Epiphany" comes from the Greek word "to reveal". This day is known as "Theophany" – the revelation of God to Man.

The Feast of the Epiphany is also known to some as Three Kings Day, and Little Christmas. It marks the end of Christmastide. In eastern Europe, it is as important as Christmas Day. Some people also refer to this day as "Saint Nicholas Day. However, the Feast of Saint Nicholas is celebrated on December 6th.

For many, the nativity scene, with the manger and figurines of those at the stable on this day, is kept up through January 6th, and are the last decorations to be put away until next Christmas.

Did You Know? The song "The Twelve Days of Christmas" refers to the period between Christmas and The Feast of the Epiphany. Many, if not most people, erroneously associate this period with the twelve days leading up to Christmas.



The next rotation of **Sunday School** begins January 8th at 10am. The Unity class will study Ruth and Ester in the Fellowship Hall. The Faithseekers will view and discuss the movie, *War Room*, downstairs past the library, and the Grace class will meet in the lower cottage to discuss the move/ book, *The Shack*.



Outreach Summary for 2022

It has once again been an amazing year of extravagant giving as we reach out to serve our community, both near and far. Your Outreach Team has once again been able to share your gifts to help those struggling during difficult times. This year, we added a mission statement/scripture for our Outreach Team:

1 Peter 4:10-11 "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ."

As a church, we have been called to practice radical hospitality. "Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality." Romans 12:13 (NIV) Below are some of the areas that you have blessed our neighbors:

- In partnership with the Faithseekers Sunday School class, we continue to provide **Fremont Street** with 15 weekly "weekend bags" of food to sustain children most at risk of food insecurity. Outreach provided \$1000 toward the collection. We also provided the staff with gift cards (from an anonymous donation) for Christmas.
- WATTS was provided supplies and +60 volunteers to prepare dinner and to serve those meals to the homeless men and women sheltering at the Stonewall Ruritan during our week following Thanksgiving. It was a blessing to welcome our volunteers and WATTS friends back to the Ruritan. We are grateful for their willingness to let us use their facility. We provided \$1100 in purchased food and supplies for our week, and received many donations of additional food, desserts, and clothing.
- \$1785 annual donation to WATTS to support the ongoing mission to shelter
- **Bright Futures** received a collection of school supplies with an estimated value over \$500. We are also providing 8 mentors at Greenwood Mill E.S.
- **Salvation Army** was provided third Sunday lunches January- August (they were closed for renovations September-December), provided 50 treat bags for Easter (valued at \$100), over 20 gift bags for

Christmas (valued at \$200) and had 44 volunteers for Red Kettle bell ringing on three December Saturdays. 25 Christmas dinner/breakfast baskets for Social Services – value +\$2500

- Rescue Mission received \$500 towards a privacy fence for the women's shelter
- \$2285 donation to **Laurel Center** and collections of snacks, bottled water, jackets, comforters and backpacks in February, May, and October– value +\$1500
- CCAP-
- Provided 6-8 volunteers first Monday or Tuesday night each month to pack food boxes
- Various underclothing items collected in January value +\$690
- Collected food for Easter baskets value +\$590
- Diapers collected in March and November value +\$1460
- Collected socks and undergarments in July value +\$950
- Collected food for Thanksgiving value +\$1150
- Collected blankets for "thanks giving" value +\$140
- \$3285 annual donation plus additional donations from special offerings
- **Project Esperanza,** \$2535 donation to Project Esperanza in the Dominican Republic, plus \$300 towards their recess area fundraiser and an additional \$1000 to sponsor students who weren't supported in 2021-22
- Supported an Afghanistan refugee family of 8 with financial and volunteer support
- The Believers supported **Relay for Life** and raised +\$12,500
- Financial help for several local families
- UMMen, UMWomen, Adult Sunday School Classes, Children and Youth, and many others in our church family continue to reach out into the community and support various mission projects and collections

Outreach meets the first Thursday in January, March, May, July, September, and November at 7 pm. All are welcome to join our meetings. We welcome Sharon Woodard as the new Outreach Chair in 2023.
