A Message from Our Pastor:

We live in interesting times, don't we? Who would have ever believed in their wildest dreams that the UMC would be at such a divide? The issues and challenges brought about by different interpretations of scriptures surrounding human sexuality have reached a boiling point.

In many churches, where these issues have never caused a problem, people are now having to choose sides. There are still many faithful Methodists but many are just plain tired of conflict and have either quit the church or have moved on. Where there was never mistrust of leadership before, there is now apprehension, doubt and wild scenario's being embraced. Where there was harmony and peace there is now discord and factions. Where there was a common vision and purpose, there is now a lack of clarity.

The UMC family is fractured. How sad and how unnecessary. Both laity and clergy are feeling the stress and strain, and yes, fear of the unknown. The evil one is smiling! Everything is going just as he planned. Divide and conquer.

Where is Burnt Factory in all this continuing controversy? Has Burnt Factory stopped mission work? Has Burnt Factory quit loving each other? Has there been ugliness, bickering, and name-calling over the issues? Has there been heated arguments and dirty looks over the issues? Has Burnt Factory suffered a wide scale disappearance of members? Does Burnt Factory have money problems? Have we turned our backs on the community we serve? The answer to all these questions is a resounding, emphatic, **NO**!

Burnt Factory is thriving, and it can be argued that we are, as our District Superintendent said this past Monday Night, one of the most vital congregations in the district. Out of 154 churches in the Shenandoah River District, we are the second highest attended church in the district and lately we have been flirting with being the top attended church per Sunday. For the first quarter, we averaged 233 in physical presence and another 75 joining us through our streaming service. Our mission outreach is at an all-time high and very soon, (be on the look-out) we will be making some huge contributions to several of our signature community and global ministries.

We are taking in new members and re-instituting pre-pandemic ministries. We are not perfect. We have many areas where improvement is needed but unless I'm looking at things through rose-colored glasses, I would say, Burnt Factory is doing alright. Jesus is still being exalted! The Bible is still the word of God. Mission, service, and outreach are still the heart of our evangelism. The family that is Burnt Factory may have a disagreement from time to time, we may have different opinions and different politics, but the family is still alive and well and most important of all, the family is still intact! I pray that it stays that way. Don't you?

From a branch on the Vine,

"I'll keep working my way back to you, babe", a great song from 1978 by the Spinners. Let that run around in your head awhile – with a little rhythm going down your spine. Besides the beat, what about the words? *Working my way back*.

Do you feel you are working to be back into God's good graces? First thing – did you ever leave God's graces? I know a family where the grandmother raised her children, helped raise her grandchildren, and is now raising her great-grandchildren. Parents, you know how hard it is to keep up with kids. Think about doing that when you are 88. I asked her about it, and she said, "What am I supposed to do? What would happen if I didn't help? Where would they go?" Even though others had made poor decisions, this woman still is doing the work of love because she wants the children to be successful – have a better life. That sounds like God to me. Our mistakes do not stop God from helping us to a better life. Whatever you have done, are doing, or will do – God will not stop loving you and forgiving you.

Your work is not to get back into God's graces. God's grace is available now and the start of where your life goes. For we are saved by grace (not by works or anything we can do) so that we can do good works in the name of our God, for His purpose.

Now that you are working on God's behalf, is it difficult? Yes, because you are doing things that friends, co-workers, strangers, even family don't understand. You are not working for the benefit of those people or yourself. You have been chosen and equipped by God. The things you do – putting others first, praying in thanksgiving, forgiving those that hurt you, being patient - are not easy, but it is not by your strength. God's installs in you an energy source called the Holy Spirit. Those in the faith know its power and its presence.

I wish some wise and caring (meddling) person would have told me this long ago. Many times, I have tried to do a good thing to balance out a bad thing; worked to pay a price so the guilt would go away. There is not a lot of peace when you are balancing scales. I spent many years messing up/ ignoring the Spirit, then working to appease God, and looking at the balance sheet to measure how I was doing. So wrapped up in *working my way back* I squashed the joy of being a child of God. I'm better now, but still in recovery.

I embrace the God who didn't leave me in the mud. He took a cross and scrubbed me clean; then set me on a path that leads to life eternal. The Lord and I walk the path together. He stills pulls me back from the rabbit trails, picks me up after tripping over worldly pursuits. He guides me to Himself and the paradise of His Kingdom. Guilt comes and goes, but He writes his Word upon my heart: *God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him (John 3:17). "Come now, let us settle the matter," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool (Isaiah 1:18). Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! (2 Corinthians 5:17).*

We have Good News – we are already back with God because Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life. Thanks be to God.

There are two job opportunities available at Burnt Factory UMC: **Nursery Director** and **Audio/ Visual Assistant**. Below are the job descriptions. If you or you know someone looking for an opportunity to serve in the Kingdom, please forward resumes with cover letters to Judy McIntire, Chair Pastor-Parrish Relations Committee at Judymci99.gmail.com by April 24th.

AV/IT Assistant Job Description \$4,800.00 annually. Approximately 5-8 hours a week.

The AV/IT Assistant is responsible for assisting the AV/IT Lead Technician to produce the best possible atmosphere for worship through audio and video technology within regular Church services as well as any additional services throughout the year. This would include assisting the AV/IT Lead Technician as directed to prepare visual aids to coincide with the Pastor's sermon and supporting the audio/video/streaming needs of the Church service. The AV/IT assistant may be required to operate as backup to the AV/IT Lead Technician when necessary.

Specific Responsibilities of the AV/IT assistant include, but are not limited to the following:

Pre-service

- Have ProPresenter slides prepared and ready to begin per the direction of the AV/IT Lead Technician, Pastor, and worship committee.
- Work with AV/IT Lead Technician to set up ProPresenter, Steaming, and sound equipment prior to service and perform sound and line checks to assure the system is in working order.
- Assist AV/IT Lead Technician in working with Pastor, Choir Director, and/or Accompanist for schedule and any changes prior to the service.

During service

- Follow AV/IT Lead Technician and Pastor's direction during the service (slideshow screen timing, sound level adjustments, etc.).
- Assist AV/IT Lead Technician in streaming service (Starting Live Stream, Scene Changes throughout Service, Ending Live Stream, etc.)
- Assist to assure that slideshow photos, hymns and other wording for the congregation are on the screen in a timely manner per the Pastor's direction.
- Assist AV/IT Lead Technician to provide the congregation with a distraction-free audio/video service.

Post-service

- Note any faulty or broken equipment and report to AV/IT Lead Technician or Pastor (in absence of AV/IT Lead Technician).
- Discuss with AV/IT Lead Technician any issues, areas in need of improvement, etc.
- Assist AV/IT Lead Technician and Pastor to make changes as needed for future services.





Nursery Director Position \$7,500 annually. Average 8-10 hours a week.

Ministry Purpose:

To provide safe, secure, nurturing, clean and efficient care to our children while following the Safe Sanctuaries policies set by the Virginia Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. *Early childhood is the best time to build a God-centered worldview for children.*

Basic functions:

- Scheduling staff in the nursery and ensuring proper coverage that follows the Safe Sanctuaries guidelines.
- Training of new hires and volunteers in the nursery area.
- Work with the Minister of Children and Family to establish & implement policies and procedures in the nursery.
- Responsible for implementing policies and procedures.
- Manage intake/outtake of children on Sunday services and any special or evening services with the current check-in system.
- Engage with children in the nursery through crafts, music, games and stories to teach the children basic Christian fundamentals.
- Manage staff/volunteer time with the children during services.
- Rotation, organization and cleansing of classroom, toys, furniture and other nursery items.
- Communicate supply needs to Minister of Children and Family.
- Report any personnel issues to Minister of Children and Family.
- Issuing of paperwork to new families/visitors.
- Management & organization of curriculum & nursery files.
- Appropriate care of children including diaper changes and feedings if necessary.
- Maintain adequate supplies & inventory for the nursery & children's Ministry activities.
- Procure supplies & materials for the nursery & for teachers.
- Assist with planning and set up of child activities (ie: Church picnic, VBS, family fall fun festival, Christmas play, evening services, Easter activities and egg hunt). This includes purchasing of supplies for events, gathering of volunteers and set up/clean up.
- Coordinate volunteer gifts on 5th Sundays and larger events (VBS, Camp, Christmas play).
- Provide assistance to Minister of Children and Family when needed.

Additional Functions:

- Ensure that only nursery staff and approved volunteers are permitted in the nursery classrooms.
- Visitors to the nursery classrooms need to be limited to parents and guardians of children who wish to tour the nursery rooms for potential care.
- All volunteers/substitutes need to be approved by the Minister of Children and Family.
- Working alongside parents to ensure the best teaching/learning opportunities.
- Praying for and with the children.

Palm Sunday, April 2nd

- Palm Sunday begins the Holy Week leading to Easter and the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. It commemorates Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem where people put their palms down in front of his path.
- On Palm Sunday, palms are distributed in church and worn by members of the congregation.
- We know Jesus' story- the surprise of the Resurrection, which we'll celebrate on Easter Sunday. Easter is a reminder that though we may turn from God's surprises, God's love persists in an undeniable way. We can't keep God from surprising us.
- When discarding old palms, remember it is a blessed religious object and should be burned or buried. Some gardeners bury it in their home garden to bless the coming year's crop.



The cross is where we see the convergence of great suffering and God's forgiveness.

<u>Psalms 85:10</u> sings of a day when "righteousness and peace" will "kiss each other." The cross of Jesus is where that occurred, where God's demands, his righteousness, coincided with his mercy. We receive divine forgiveness, mercy, and peace because Jesus willingly took our divine punishment, the result of God's righteousness against sin.

"For the joy set before him" <u>Hebrews 12:2</u>. Jesus endured the cross on Good Friday, knowing it led to his resurrection, our salvation, and the beginning of God's reign of righteousness and peace.
