Sometimes in the hectic world of ministry, I sometimes take for granted that everyone knows about our Methodist history and Wesleyan heritage. I thought I would share a short history about our founder, John Wesley

(1703-1791) in hope that we all may either develop or find a renewed appreciation for this enthusiastic, brilliant and devoted man of God. John Wesley was born June 28, 1703 and he died March 2, 1791. He was the principle founder of the Methodist movement. His mother was important in his emotional and educational development. John's education continued at Charterhouse School and at Oxford, where he studied at Christ Church and was elected in 1726 to a "fellowship" at Lincoln College. He was ordained in 1728.

After a brief absence (1727-29) to help his father Samuel (also an Anglican priest) at Epworth, John returned to Oxford to discover that his brother, Charles, had founded a Holy Club composed of young men interested in spiritual growth.

John quickly became a leading participant of this group, which was dubbed the Methodists for the methodical approach they made to discipleship. His Oxford days introduced him not only to the rich tradition of classical literature and philosophy but also spiritual classics like Thomas a Kempis' "Imitation of Christ" Jeremy Taylor's "Holy Living and Dying," and William Law's "Serious Call."



In 1735, John and Charles accompanied James Oglethorpe to the new colony in Georgia, where John's attempts to apply his then "high" church views aroused hostility. Discouraged, in 1737, he returned to England. He was rescued from despair by the influence of the Moravian (German) preacher Peter Boehler. At a small religious meeting in Aldersgate Street, London, on May 24, 1738, John Wesley had an experience in which his "heart was strangely warmed." After this spiritual experience, which centered on the realization of salvation by faith in Christ alone, he devoted his life to evangelism. Beginning in 1739, he established Methodist societies throughout the country. He traveled and preached constantly, especially in the London-Bristol- Newcastle triangle, with frequent forays into Wales, Ireland and Scotland. He encountered much opposition and persecution, which later subsided.

Late in life John Wesley married Mary Vazeille, a widow. John had no children. He continued throughout his life a regimen of personal discipline and ordered living. He died at 88, still preaching, still traveling, and still a clergyman of the Church of England. In 1784, however, he had given the Methodist Societies a legal constitution, and in the same year he ordained Thomas Coke for ministry in the United States. This action signaled an independent course for Methodism.

John Wesley said: "Do all the good you can, in all the ways you can, to all the souls you can, in every place you can, at all the times you can, with all the zeal you can, as long as ever you can. Catch on fire with enthusiasm and people will come from miles to watch you burn."

As we endure this cold winter together, let us all warm ourselves with the fire of enthusiasm; a fire that is lit by the love of Jesus Christ. As we minister together, let us burn with desire to please our Lord and seek the lost! Let us be set ablaze with encouragement, devotion, and faithfulness as we endeavor to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world! God bless you all!

Also, we will celebrate Holy Communion!





February 2024 Faith and Health Corner



Cardiovascular disease is the Number 1 killer of women

Since 2004, the American Heart Association's signature women's initiative, Go Red for Women, has addressed the awareness and clinical care gaps of women's greatest health threat, cardiovascular disease (CVD).

- Nearly 45% of women ages 20+ are living with some form of cardiovascular disease.
- Less than half of women entering pregnancy in the U.S. have optimal cardiovascular health.
- Women experience unique life stages, such as pregnancy and menopause, which can put them at an increased risk for CVD.

If you have any of these signs, call 911 and get to the hospital right away.

- 1. Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest. It lasts more than few minutes or goes away and comes back.
- 2. Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.
- 3. Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.
- 4. Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- 5. As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women may experience other symptoms that are typically less associated with heart attack, such as shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.

Even when the signs are subtle, the consequences can be deadly, especially if the person doesn't get help right away.

Even though heart disease is the number 1 killer of women in the United States, women often chalk the symptoms up to less life-threatening conditions such as acid reflux, the flu or normal aging.

A heart attack strikes someone about every 40 seconds. It occurs when the blood flow that brings oxygen to the heart muscle is severely reduced or cut off completely. This happens because the arteries that supply the heart with blood can slowly narrow from a buildup of fat, cholesterol and plaque.

Many women think the signs of a heart attack are unmistakable, but they can be subtler and sometimes confusing. Some women experiencing a heart attack describe upper back pressure that feels like squeezing or a rope being tied around them Dizziness, lightheadedness or fainting are other symptoms.

Take care of yourself

Heart disease can be mostly preventable. So be sure to:

- Schedule an appointment with your health care provider to learn your risk for heart disease.
- Quit smoking. Just one year after you quit, you'll cut your risk of coronary heart disease by 50%.
- Aim for at least 150 minutes a week of moderate-intensity aerobic activity (such as brisk walking) or 75 minutes of vigorous aerobic activity (such as jogging), or a combination of both, preferably spread throughout the week.
 It's also good to include moderate-to-high intensity muscle strengthening activity (such as resistance or weight training) at least twice a week.
- Modify your family's diet if needed. Make smart substitutions, healthy snacking ideas and better prep methods.

Here is what we at Outreach have been doing to share the love of Christ

February 4th, we will begin collecting for the Laurel Center. A list of requested items will be printed in the bulletin. The last day of collection will be February 18.

Despite snow, ice and bitter temperatures, our team gathered on January 21st to assemble meals of beef vegetable soup, sandwiches, fruit, cookies and chips to take to families in motels who are being helped by Family Promise. This organization works to rescue families on the brink of homelessness. Our team members donated, assembled and delivered 66 meals to 18 families (32 adults, 31 children) at 9 different motels throughout the city of Winchester and Frederick County! Thank you to all team members and to Robin Russell for being our Family Promise point of contact and delivery coordinator.

At the request of the Red Cross, due to an urgent need, Dennis Loeffler organized a blood drive on January 9th in the Fellowship Hall. We collected 26 units of blood, surpassing our goal of 20. Many thanks to Dennis for leading this effort. Our next drive will be held March 14.

On the second Wednesday of February, we will "Fill the Freedge". This is an ongoing effort to raise awareness and participation in donating to the CCAP "Freedge" at 419 N. Cameron Street in Winchester (in the alcove in front of the Our Health building) and at 700 Aylor Road in Stephens City (at Abundant Life Church). Just drop by anytime during the day. If you have extra food that may go bad or cleaning out your fridge to go away. You can drop those things off and they will *not* go to waste. I encourage everyone to contribute to this effort. 

CCAP Corner February 2024

CCAP is a cooperative effort of individuals, civic groups, businesses, and religious communities in Winchester and Frederick County. They have unified to provide financial, material, and supportive assistance in a loving way. Even with the help of existing social service programs, CCAP clients are unable to meet their needs and responsibilities. CCAP's desire is to do God's work in a world where many basic human needs are simply not met.

A few *CCAP statistics from 2023*: 7207 individuals received food, 3973 individuals received financial help and 4590 individuals received clothing assistance.

<u>2nd Annual Pickleball Tournament</u> – A one-day pickleball tournament on **Saturday**, **2/24** is being organized by the Winchester Parks and Recreation Department in partnership with CCAP. Everyone is welcome to play!! The entry fee per two-member team is \$75 plus 5 canned food items. All proceeds will benefit CCAP.

Our next CCAP collection will be for the EASTER FOOD GIVEAWAY. We will be collecting items for the Easter food boxes to be given away on Saturday, 3/23 at CCAP. Signup sheets for particular items will be in the Fellowship Hall Sunday, 2/25 and 3/3. Items should be delivered to the Red CCAP bins in the Narthex by Sunday, 3/17.

<u>Opportunities to Serve</u> – There are many ways to volunteer your time at CCAP. There is a big need currently for clothing house volunteers. Go to <u>www.ccapwinchester.org</u> and click on the donate/volunteer tab at the top of the page for a description of the many opportunities to share your talents and time. You can also reach out to me or anyone on the Outreach Team if you have any questions about what we do as volunteers at CCAP.

A third Friendly Neighborhood FREEDGE will be dedicated on 1/31: The original at 419 N Cameron St, the 2nd located at 700 Aylor Rd at Abundant Life Church, and a third on Montague Ave to be dedicated on 1/31. All are open 24 hours a day!! These are intended to serve low-income residents. Items needed: Fresh fruits and vegetables, granola, cheese, soups, prepackaged sandwiches, garden foods, and yogurt.

Donations needed: Gently used winter clothing, especially Toddler and Children sizes. Men's jeans, belts, hooded sweat jackets, sweatpants and sweatshirts, tennis shoes (all sizes men, women and children); Gently used Linens including bedsheets, pillowcases, blankets and towels; adult backpacks and personal hygiene items. All donations may be dropped off Monday – Friday from 10am-1pm at 212 S Kent St. Winchester.


