We are not supposed to lead a horse to water so that they can drink, we are to make the horse thirsty so they will want to search for and find the living water that is Jesus Christ.

We can help for sure, but it is the Holy Spirit working within us and working in the heart of the unbeliever that true transformation and conversion can take place and it will never happen without love being the center of our words, actions and witness. It is not for the evangelist to judge, condemn or scare. It is the work of the evangelist to reflect Jesus Christ, and Jesus Christ never used those tactics to evangelize anyone.

Jacob Duche (Pronounced Duck) an Anglican Priest, arrived at Carpenter's Hall in Philadelphia at 9:00 a.m. on September 7, 1774. He was invited to come and deliver the first opening prayer for the first gathering of the Continental Congress. After reading Psalm 35, he delivered the following prayer that would unite all gathered there to their sacred purpose.

"O Lord our Heavenly Father, high and mighty King of kings, and Lord of lords, who dost from thy throne behold all the dwellers on earth and reignest with power supreme and uncontrolled over all the Kingdoms, Empires and Governments; look down in mercy, we beseech Thee, on these our American States, who have fled to Thee from the rod of the oppressor and thrown themselves on Thy gracious protection, desiring to be henceforth dependent only on Thee.

To Thee have they appealed for the righteousness of their cause; to Thee do they now look up for that countenance and support, which Thou alone canst give. Take them, therefore, Heavenly Father, under Thy nurturing care; give them wisdom in Council and valor in the field; defeat the malicious designs of our cruel adversaries; convince them of the unrighteousness of their Cause and if they persist in their sanguinary purposes, of own unerring justice, sounding in their hearts, constrain them to drop the weapons of war from their unnerved hands in the day of battle!

Be Thou present, O God of wisdom, and direct the councils of this honorable assembly; enable them to settle things on the best and surest foundation. That the scene of blood may be speedily closed; that order, harmony and peace may be effectually restored, and truth and justice, religion and piety, prevail and flourish amongst the people.

Preserve the health of their bodies and vigor of their minds; shower down on them and the millions they here represent, such temporal blessings as Thou seest expedient for them in this world and crown them with everlasting glory in the world to come. All this we ask in the name and through the merits of Jesus Christ, Thy Son and our Savior."

I had the pleasure of visiting John Wesley's England back in June. I literally stepped back in time, walked streets that were ancient, stood in medieval Abbeys and castles, and my eyes gazed upon some of God's most beautiful landscapes. Seeing how vast England's country is, I am in awe of the traveling Pastor, John Wesley and his great love of God, that was so deep that he spent all his time traveling from one place to the next just to serve God's people, congregants that he too loved. No small feat as the roads are still mostly one lane roads today, and it can take hours to go 50 miles. I was in awe of the simplicity of life over there. Time stands still in the north of England and Scotland. Not a Target or Walmart in sight! Even in the larger cities, London has Harrods, large dept. store, and some major shopping, but mostly there are some conveniences, shops, small grocers, small pharmacies, but the scene all around is stuck in the simplicity of "times of old". I spent ten days without large department stores etc. and didn't miss it. I spent ten days living on the clothes I packed in my carry-on suitcase, didn't miss my huge wardrobe. I spent ten days visiting local coffee shops, bakeries, and restaurants in Inns, didn't miss the large chains. I realized that in those ten days simplicity was something that I have been missing. John Wesley lived this way, and the people there today don't mind living with simple means. I have had a blast watching the World Cup attendees from other countries talk about visiting America and all the fun stuff it has. I have enjoyed hearing their commentaries on how they thought America and Americans to be, based upon social media and hear-say, and being here it's totally different. I too have had this experience. I went to London with pre-conceived notions from social media, and was pleasantly surprised to find out, it wasn't like that at all. In fact, our Uber driver was from Iran, he picked up two American women, and he was very kind. We had him laughing so hard because he had asked us about what we do in America, our jobs, our hobbies, etc. (traffic was very bad), and when we told him that we live in the mountains, see bears and snakes (I shared that I love snakes and actually pick them up), my sister who lives in Denver talked about seeing mountain lions on trails, and he said we were two of the most brave women he had ever known, He was laughing saying that he would want us to go with him down scary alley ways because American Women aren't scared of anything! Here is a man that our two countries are at war with one another, laughing and sharing stories in an Uber! In those 30 minutes we spent with him, I totally believe that was a peace accord. Any pre-conceived notions about one another were set aside as we laughed and told stories of our homelands. We were both foreigners in England, and we had that in common. This trip was so much more than a vacation. It was eye opening, life changing. It was an opportunity to be open to other cultures, living simply, and being the light of Christ in every moment. We can talk a big talk, but can we walk a big walk?

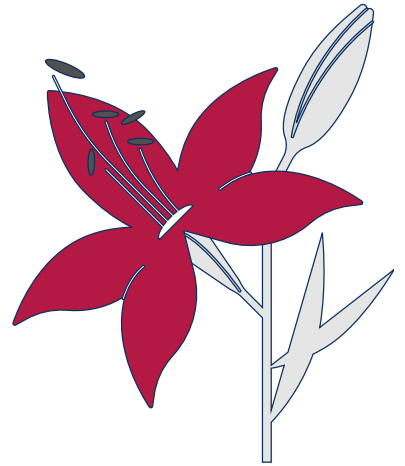

Understanding your personal risk factors is an important first step toward prevention and early intervention.

Practical Steps for Better Health

- Take medications as prescribed.
- Choose nutritious foods, including fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and lean proteins.
- Engage in regular physical activity.

Thank you so much for embracing our Syrian refugee family and celebrating Farhan's graduation from Handley High School. The family was brought to the U.S. in January 2025 through the United Nations due to the longstanding war in Syria where more than 3 million civilians have been killed. While waiting to learn where his family would be resettled, Farhan taught himself English using his cell phone. After only one year in the U.S. he was invited to join National Honor Society, and was accepted for admission to both UVA and JMU. Due to financial constraints he will take a gap year and apply again in the fall for both admission and financial aid. His goal is to become a mechanical engineer.

He gave permission to share his college essay with you:

"The hardest lesson I ever learned was that hope, like anything, could be replaced . It started when the loud bang of war forced my family to cross a dark river illegally just to find temporary shelter. It was obviously one of the most challenging things I would ever endure at that moment. I was wrong. The most challenging experience was the waiting that ensued; the four years trapped in stateless limbo.

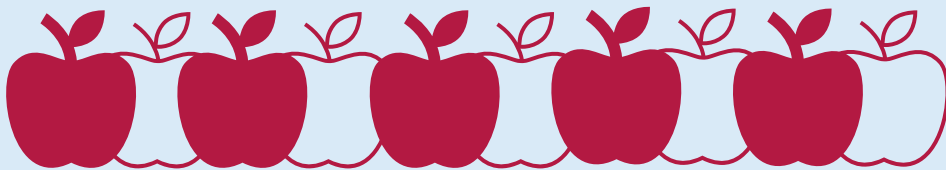
In the refugee country I found myself in, life was an ideological slow attrition. Poverty forced me to drop out of school to help and accept jobs in which I constantly was demeaned and treated as less than a human being. I was broke, depressed, and experienced constant racism, epitomized by my neighbor that cursed at our door every night. I had shrunk my entire world to shame; even the girl I liked wouldn't talk to me because I had no money. Hope was gone. I only felt a hollow sacrifice, and I was simply trying to make it through the next day.

Then, the United Nations called my father. After years of tortuous waiting, the ICMC (International Catholic Migration Commission) and UN conducted five separate interviews about four years in total. Each call was a flash of lightning, followed by months of darkness. The slow draw out of the process was to vet and validate the rationality of adopting a family, for the land of plenty.

When the last call was announced, we were joyful, we sold everything we owned, said rushed goodbyes to everyone we loved, and arrived at the airport full of new life. Yet even the last leg home had a final lesson in chaos for us. After a very long plane journey to New York, we were shuttled to Wooster, Massachusetts, where nobody was waiting for us. With nowhere to go around midnight, in the cold, we learned an error had occurred. We were then sent to Winchester, Virginia. In that moment of being abandoned and cold, it was clear that the illusion of ease had been stripped away.

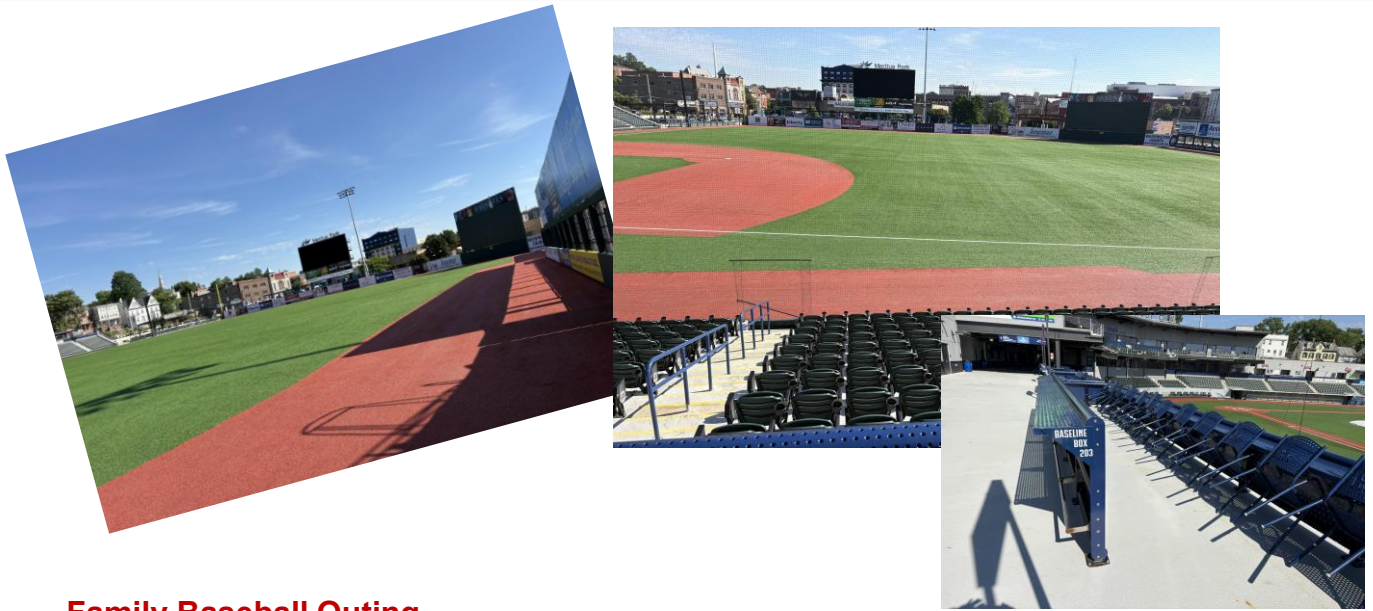
When we got to our little house, I knew we were done waiting, and our work was about to begin. As the only person in the family fluent in English, I stepped back into the role of anchor. I negotiated through the bureaucracy, walked 40 minutes through the cold to get groceries, and enrolled back into school myself. Things began to improve: I got a steady job, my phone plan, even a girl to talk to. My biggest test occurred when my father broke his foot. Immediately, my personal plans went on hold. I resumed working a second job, once again trading sleep for security, because I became the steward of our home.

Maybe things never got any better but I did , I'm a better, stronger and smarter person , and that's what matters. I started looking at life from a different perspective, maybe hope can fade, but resilience can take its place. Everything I've been through taught me how to stand, lead and believe in myself to keep going. Maybe hope hasn't come yet but I have no doubt that it's on its way."
